

COUNTY GROUP OPPOSES TRUCK LIMIT MEASURE

PORTLAND, Jan. 15 (AP)—The Association of Oregon Counties Thursday presented to the state highway commission a resolution opposing any move to make permanent the present emergency limits on truck lengths and weight.

The highway board gave no indication of its stand. The association anticipates the introduction in the legislature of a bill by private interests which would put into law the present 68,000-pound weight and 60-foot length limit.

Maintenance Aid
The board set a precedent by agreeing to share in the cost of constructing service roadways paralleling the Pacific highway at Waverly lake near Albany to provide safer entrances and exits for home owners. Chairman Henry F. Calbell predicted similar construction elsewhere in the state.

The board agreed to help cities maintain highways through their limits in cases where the work is done by city employees.

1943 HARVEST TO DEPEND ON WOMEN, REPORT

SALEM, Jan. 15 (AP)—Women and children, who harvested more than 60 per cent of Oregon's seasonal farm crops last year, will have to do even more during 1943, officials of the U. S. employment service told the state agricultural advisory committee here yesterday.

During the 1942 harvest season, only 35,548 of the 93,373 farm placements were men over 18, while there were 39,150 women placed on farms.

Only 10 per cent of the harvest workers came from outside of the state, while more than two-thirds were from communities near the harvest areas.

More Labor Seen
L. C. Stoll, area director for the war manpower commission, said the letdown in cantonment construction and a drop in labor demands by shipyards might help farmers in getting experienced farm machine men.

Stoll urged the farmers to plant all the essential crops they can, assuring them they would have the labor to harvest them.

The conference agreed that a publicity and advertising campaign must be held to educate the public that a farm boy who does not go to war is not a slacker; there must be more adequate training of children for harvest work; wholesome surroundings in harvest fields must be provided for children; and drunkenness and other forms of absenteeism, which caused some loss of man-hours in harvest fields last season, must be curbed.

Dant-Russell Lease Holdings

REDMOND, Jan. 15 (AP)—Dant & Russell announced today the leasing of its holdings for one year to Bert Peterson and Philip Dahl, operators of the Tite Knot pine mill here.

The lease covers all mill and processing facilities of Dant & Russell which was not destroyed or rebuilt since a fire last July.
