## "I DIDN'T RESIST", SAYS MISS HANSEN

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15 (AP)—Betty Hansen, little grey-eyed blonde, reiterated today at the trial of Movie Actor Errol Flynn on statutory rape charges that she made no effort to dissuade him from armorous advances on the occasion when, she alleges, he was intimate with her in the bedroom of a Bel-Air mansion.

"Did you resist Flynn's attempt to be intimate with you in any way?" Deputy District Attorney Thomas Cochran asked on re-direct examination.

"No," Miss Hansen replied, "I did not."  
"Did you push him, or shove him, or ask him not to do it?"  
"No, sir."

She was calm today, in contrast to the sobbing reaction under cross-examination. She had changed her sweater for a forest green sports shirt as she took the stand for further questioning by Defense Attorney Jerry Giesler.

Giesler read from a transcript of her testimony before the grand jury, then asked her if she told the jury that on two occasions she had been guilty of acts of perversion.

"I did," she replied.  
"Do you hope not to be prosecuted for that crime?"  
"Yes."

"The man involved in that crime was convicted?"  
"Yes."  
"You refused to testify against him on the grounds that it might incriminate you?"  
"Yes."

She denied, however, that she had been promised immunity by becoming a prosecution witness.

Flynn sat impassively watching her. For the third time in the trial, he appeared in a change of costume. The brown suit he wore yesterday was succeeded by one of slate blue.

## WOUNDED YANKS AWAIT RETURN TO BATTLEFIELD

SEATTLE, Jan. 15 (AP)—Tales of heroism and courage continue to come from the naval hospital here, where the wounded, almost to a man, now keenly aware of what war means, nevertheless await their eventual return to battle with determination.

Lawrence A. Lang, 36, marine sergeant from Wheeling, W. Va., told yesterday of a successful submarine landing on Jap-held Makin Island last August 17.

**Destination Unknown**  
The raid, in which Lieut. Col. James Roosevelt, son of the president, participated, was engineered after months of training in inflated rubber boats.

"We didn't know where we were going when we started training," Lang, hospitalized with a bullet-shattered elbow, explained in an interview, "but we knew it was going to be serious business. We were reasonably sure we were going after Japs if we had to sneak up on 'em in submarines."

**Shoot First**  
"We landed under cover of darkness just before daybreak. The fighting started about a half an hour later and it was pretty hot and heavy after that. It was close range stuff, 30 to 100 yards, but no hand-to-hand fighting."

"You usually shoot the other fellow or he shoots you before you get that close."

Lang said he was taken off the island, one of the Gilbert group, after the Japanese detachment had been wiped out.

He described Colonel Roosevelt as a "swell fellow." "He's right up in the front line, in action."

**BLIND and unquestioning confidence.**  
Maybe that's the German soldier's job. When a senseless order is given to American soldiers, their inclination is to ask: "Why?" They can see no gain in dying for nothing. This writer has entire confidence that the American way will win out in the long run.

(High-ranking German officers have been reported to be fleeing by plane from the Stalingrad area.)

**THERE'S** nothing significantly new in Africa. Both sides are getting ready for the heavy fighting that will follow the letting up of the winter rains.

**ON** the home front, the labor situation in the hard coal mines in the East and the Kaiser shipyards in the West is certainly disgusting in this time of all-out war when American boys are fighting and dying on widely scattered fronts, but we must remember that labor big shots are running the government at Washington and there are NO ELECTIONS in the immediate offing. So there isn't much that can be done about it now.

**WE'LL** just have to depend on the innate common sense and unquestioned patriotism of labor's rank and file, whose boys are fighting and dying along with the rest. In their own good time, the average rank and file can be depended upon to clean up the sour spots in the labor set-up.

The trouble with the big shots is that they're blinded by TOO MUCH MONEY.
