

# Whirlwind Pianist Thrills Audience

### Witold Maluczynski Instant Favorite With Klamath Folks in Friday Night's Performance

Witold Maluczynski, the young Polish pianist who performed on the Pelican stage last night as the second of a series of concerts brought here by the Klamath Community Concert association, lived up to rave notices which have flooded the country since his debut at Carnegie hall this past year. From the opening notes of the Beethoven numbers, to the last echo of the second encore, Chopin's Etude, op. 25, No. 11, Maluczynski held his audience as few artists have done in our town.

The youthful Maluczynski, last pupil of Ignace Jan Paderewski, displayed a remarkable technique and an amazing energy, power, largeness of style. The program had periods of grandeur, interpretive individuality, emotional concentration. He is armed with noteworthy technical equipment, a warm singing tone, a wide range of dynamics, with fingers fleet and sure.

Those who love their Chopin more than anything else in the wide field of music, were thrilled to hear the Sonata in B flat minor, opus 35, and the third group which included the lovely Nocturne in F sharp major, Waltz in C sharp minor, Etude in C minor, Mazurka in F minor and Scherzo in B flat minor.

During intermission even those who admit to a bit of weariness to an entire program of piano, violin, or voice, had to acknowledge that here was a young man who could play on indefinitely without tiring his audience. Much of Maluczynski's charm was in his attitude toward the house as compared to the Terrible Tempered Mr. Bangs who, last year, did not please the audience one whit and the audience, in turn, felt that it did not please him. But Mr. Maluczynski took care of that.

Paderewski's Nocturne and Cracovienne Fantastique opened the second half of the program followed by Liszt's Spanish Rhapsody, a number which expanded into a brilliant climax.

The favorite Waltz E Minor, Chopin, along with the final encore from Chopin, ended a thrilling evening.

Said Mark Schubart in New York's PM, "Maluczynski has just come from South America where one critic hailed him as a successor to Paderewski. That's a heavy mantle to have handed down to you. But it may not be long before he'll be ready to carry it."
