It is his opinion that in a great majority of instances the negligence and indifference of parents are definite contributing factors when boys and girls are delinquent. According to Mr. Bridge two things badly needed in Klamath Falls are recreational rooms, properly supervised, for both boys and girls, and a detention home where children may be temporarily placed while their cases are being investigated or where children in need of shelter may be placed.

Mrs. Arlet Edsall gave a most interesting talk on the emotional impact of the war, especially in its relation to children, who are suffering from a feeling of insecurity in these confusing times. 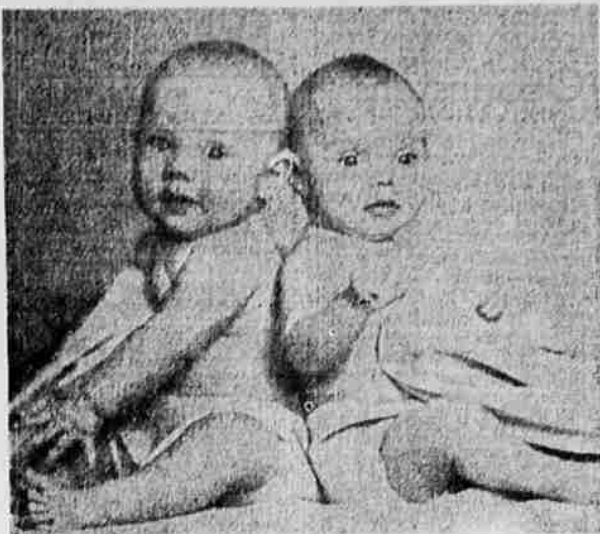
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Refreshments were served following the meeting to forty-three members and guests of the club.
