

Unbeaten Hoopers Fall In High School Battles

Pelicans Defeat Grants Pass After Medford Victory; Eugene Wins Eleven

Two more unbeaten Oregon high school basketball teams stumbled last weekend, Salem swamping Oregon City, 41-27, and Hood River nosing out The Dalles, 23-21. For the Dalles it was the first loss in seven games, for Oregon City, the first in nine. Other powerful ninets added to their prestige meanwhile. Eugene won its 11th game in 12 starts, defeating Junction City, 47-32. It was the second straight district six victory for the team.

Roseburg, undefeated in the Southern Oregon conference, went outside the league to down the strong Marshfield team for the second time, 38-36.

Grants Pass spilled Medford, 32-26, Friday, but in turn was defeated by Klamath Falls Saturday, 32-24.

In eastern Oregon Pendleton added to its record, defeating Walla Walla twice, 31-30 and 30-24. La Grande nosed out Milton-Freewater, 41-40.

In western Oregon Milwaukie trimmed Gresham, 44-20, its fourth win in five games, and Central Catholic of Portland downed Parkrose, 31-17, its sixth win in seven games.

California Set Back by Southern Cal at Berkeley Saturday With 32-27 Win

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18 (AP)—The University of Southern California looked more and more today like the team to beat in this year's coast conference southern division basketball chase.

The Trojans are the team to beat, that is, if any of three rivals can. So far California has tried twice without success, and Stanford once.

UCLA has yet to make the effort. But the Bruins' chance will come Friday night at Los Angeles, the same evening Stanford and California collide at Palo Alto to settle their last-play argument.

California's most recent setback at the hands of the Trojan came 32-27 at Berkeley Saturday night and followed a 39-32 defeat in Los Angeles the previous week. Stanford took its trimming 41-32 at Palo Alto Friday.

UCLA was idle over the weekend so far as conference play goes but still has a grasp at least on second place by virtue of its 49-40 victory over California the week before.

Game Commission Fixes Seasons, Bag Limits

Klamath Trout Season From May 1 to October 31; Bag Limit Set at 15 Fish

PORTLAND, Jan. 18 (AP)—The state game commission tentatively fixed the trout season in Oregon from April 17 to October 31, at a meeting here Saturday with major exceptions.

The exceptions are in Baker, Grant, Harney, Klamath, Lake, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wheeler and Malheur counties where it will be from May 1 to October 31.

The bag limit will be 15 fish or 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, but not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

Special seasons and bag limits for Klamath county are as follows:

Klamath river, October 1 to May 31, inclusive; Seven Mile creek, May 1 to September, inclusive.

Lake o' the Woods, May 1 to November 30, inclusive. Bag limit, 10 pounds and one fish but not to exceed 10 fish in any one day, or 20 pounds and two fish but not to exceed 20 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Odell, Crescent, Davis, Upper Klamath and Agency lakes, May 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided, however, the open season is the entire year in that portion of Upper Klamath lake from Modoc Point to Eagle Ridge south to Link river.

Link river and Lake Ewauna, open season the entire year. All other lakes in Klamath county, May 1 to September 30, inclusive. Lost river, August 1 to October 31, inclusive.

Closed to all angling: That part of Klamath river for a distance of 4000 feet below and 2000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek.

Spencer creek, that part of Link river beginning at the California-Oregon Power company's dam on said river to a point 200 feet below said dam. Odell creek.

PORTLAND, Jan. 18 (AP)—Bill Morgan, former star University of Oregon tackle, finally was inducted into the Marine corps here Saturday.

Morgan, who played professional football with the New York Giants after graduation, had tried intermittently since Pearl Harbor to enlist, but had been rejected because of his weight. Saturday he had taken off 80 pounds and, weighing a mere 240, was accepted.

WSC Cagers Win Second Oregon Tilt

PULLMAN, Jan. 18 (AP)—Washington State evened its opening series of the northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball season with the University of Oregon here Saturday night.

Oregon won the opener Friday and WSC's Cougars came back strong to take Saturday's contest, 46-40. The game left Oregon out in front of the coast conference with three victories to one defeat, having won two straight from Idaho at Moscow earlier in the week.

Washington State had a bare 29-19 advantage at the half and went ahead in the nip and tuck battle only when the Webfoots let down momentarily in the second period.

State's ace forward, Gail Bishop, was high point man for the night with 16 points.

Cougar Boxers Meet Gonzaga in Opening Scrap

Klamath high school hoop teams made a clean sweep of the weekend games. The Pelicans dropped the Grants Pass Cavemen on the Grants Pass floor Saturday night for the third consecutive time by a score of 32-28. The Wildcats beat Bonanza B team.

The Grants Pass-Pelican tilt was a riotous affair with the crowd cheering so loudly that the referee's whistle couldn't be heard. Klamath took the lead at the quarter 15-12 and led by Bocchi and Welch on the score to 21-12 at the half. The score at the end of the third period was 28-20.

In a last minute rally, the Cavemen made eight points to the Pelicans' four to bring the score to 32-28. A field goal and two foul shots brought the score to 24-30. Foster of Klamath sunk one, and the Cavemen desperately stabbed two more field goals in the net before the final whistle blew.

Welch and Bocchi led the scoring with scores of twelve and ten each. Foster and Bocchi handled the ball well and worked zone defense by passing cutting. Rex Young, playing center, did an excellent job of getting the ball off the backboards.

The small Grants Pass court hampered the fast breaking Pelican game somewhat, but the Klamath men settled down to a game of zone defense and offense to protect their lead in the third quarter.

On the local floor Saturday night, the Wildcats dropped the Bonanza high school hoopmen by a score of 38-23, leading all the way in a rough game, though no men were ousted for personal fouls.

Eastman of the Wildcats was high score man. In the Wildcat preliminary, the Frosh basketballers defeated the Bonanza B squad and continued their unbroken string of victories. A bucket by Tom Snyder, lanky ruck forward, in the final minute put the game on ice for the Klamath team.

The Frosh, coached by Paul Deller, have beat the Merrill and Malin B teams and won a scrimmage tilt with the Junior high school. Next Tuesday the Wildcats and Freshmen will play Chiloquin at Chiloquin.
