FLYNN WITNESS TELLS OF EASY LIFE IN JAIL LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20 (AP) - Peggy La Rue Satterlee, demure appearing brunette night club entertainer, described today a life of Riley as guest of police-women since being taken in custody as a witness against Errol Flynn, and referred to an operation for which, she said, she hoped the man involved would not be prosecuted. After much discussion of men and operations, Deputy District Attorney Thomas Cochran said the state was willing to stipulate that the operation under discussion was an abortion. "Did you ever talk to anyone in authority with relation to any operation you have had?" Defense Attorney Jerry Giesler asked. "Yes, sir," the 16-year-old Miss Satterlee replied. "That had relation to a particular man?" "Yes sir." "Did you request the district attorney's office not to prosecute this man?" "Yes sir." "And did they not promise you that they would not prosecute that man if you would testify in this case?" "No sir." "They indicated that they would not prosecute that man?" "They told me it would not be brought up." "You knew the operation you had was a criminal act, didn't you? You knew the district attorney's office could prosecute for such a criminal act?" "Yes sir." The testimony tossed a bomb into Flynn's trial on three counts of statutory rape, involving Miss Satterlee and Betty Hansen, 17-year-old Nebraska girl. A few minutes before, Giesler asked: "Since you have been in custody, you have been living in private homes of policemen? You have been taken out to entertainments?" "Yes sir." "To night clubs?" "No sir." "Did you take any trips?" "To San Francisco, yes sir. We were up there about 10 days." She denied, however, that she went to any night clubs there, or had any drinks. To Giesler's question: "Were your expenses all paid?" she answered "Yes sir." The question of whether she discussed her age with Flynn when he was in a room with her on his yacht a year and a half ago, during which she testified he was intimate with her, occupied Giesler also in his cross-examination, he queried: "You asked him (Flynn) if he knew that you were J. B. - or something? He said he would take his chances, or something of that order?" "Yes, sir," Miss Satterlee replied. Giesler read then from her preliminary hearing, in which she said the only time J. B. - which she described as "Jail bait" - and S. Q. Q. - which she said means "San Quentin" - were mentioned was when she first met Flynn, several weeks before the yacht voyage. Masonic Lodge Officers Installed At Ft. JEFFERS TAKES OVER RUBBER IMPORT PLANS WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP) - William M. Jeffers, the rubber conservation director, has assumed control of all rubber import programs now exercised by the board of economic warfare, the BEW announced today. BEW said Jeffers, who thus far has concerned himself primarily with domestic synthetic production programs, notified the board January 9 that he was taking advantage of sweeping powers granted him by President Roosevelt and assuming final jurisdiction over imported rubber. Conflict BEW officials recognized Jeffers' power to do this and said that henceforth Jesse Jones, as head of the RFC's Rubber Reserve company which supplies the money, would take orders from Jeffers instead of from the BEW on this commodity. The BEW on April 13, 1942, was given authority by President Roosevelt to direct the use of RFC funds for developing foreign rubber programs. This led to a conflict with Jones which was recently aired in senate banking committee hearings on a bill to increase RFC's borrowing power. Maybe an epidemic of gout wouldn't be so bad. Washington Sets First Crew Turnout For February First SEATTLE, Jan. 20 (AP) - First crew turnout for the University of Washington will be February 1, a month later than normal, Coach Al Ulbrickson said yesterday.
