TOJO ILLNESS DELAYS NIPPON DIET SESSION

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (AP)—The office of war information said the Tokyo radio broadcast a report today that Premier Hideki Tojo is ill, and that the 81st diet would be recessed until January 27.

The broadcast was recorded by the federal communications commission as it was relayed by the Harbin, Manchukuo, station at 6 a. m. the OWI said.

A Domei broadcast from Tokyo said later that the premier was suffering from a cold but was expected to recover by January 27.

The diet has been in new year recess since December 27 but was scheduled to reconvene tomorrow.

Unusual

On tomorrow's program were several speeches by cabinet ministers outlining the empire's war policies, domestic and foreign. Tojo was to have delivered two addresses, one as premier and the other as war minister. A review of foreign affairs by Foreign Minister Masayuki Tani also was on the program.

The day on which the diet recesses after the new year usually is the most important in the session and a postponement for any cause is most unusual.

BRITISH LOOK TO '43 WITH CONFIDENCE

LONDON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Clement R. Attlee, deputy prime minister, told the opening session of parliament Tuesday that Great Britain could "look forward to 1943 with justifiable confidence," and that the successes scored by the allied nations last year were to be viewed with "sober satisfaction."

In a brief statement on the war situation pending an anticipated complete review by Prime Minister Churchill within the next few days, Attlee lauded the "wonderful achievements" of the Russian army and said "it looks as if none of the great force (before Stalingrad) will escape from the trap."

Have Confidence

Describing the allied objective in North Africa as total destruction of enemy forces, he told commons that bad weather in Tunisia had restricted movement of motorized forces and had "seriously affected the provision of airfields."

We have every confidence in General Eisenhower and General Anderson and the men of the allied forces," he said.

CD COOPERATION IN EMERGENCY ASKED

SALEM, Jan. 20 (AP)—County defense councils should be on the alert for any emergencies in which civilian defense workers can take part, the northwest sector civilian defense office advised the state defense council today.

The northwest office said civilian defense organizations "did an outstanding job" in the recent Willamette flood.

State Defense Coordinator Jerrold Owen asked county defense authorities today to have civilian engineers make surveys of structures which may be used for air raid shelters.

Radio stations should not take part in practice air raid warnings, Owen said. The stations will be closed down during real air raid alarms, so if practice warnings are broadcast, listeners might depend on them for warnings of actual attack, Owen said.

Motor Traffic Down 41 Per Cent in Rationed Areas

SALEM, Jan. 20 (AP)—Motor vehicle traffic in gasoline rationed areas is down 41 per cent, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock was advised today by federal public roads administration.

In unrationed areas, the reduction is 20.7 per cent. In Oregon there was a 20.1 per cent reduction in November, when gasoline was unrationed here.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20 (AP)—A Liberty freighter will be christened here later this week by twelve-year-old Shirley Thomas, patient at the Shriners' hospital for crippled children.

The launching will be a feature of the infantile paralysis fund campaign here.
