

# LAKE COUNTY SALARY BOOST ASKED IN BILL

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—Rep. Burt K. Snyder, Lakeview, and Sen. Marshall Cornett, Klamath Falls, introduced a bill in the house today to increase salaries of Lake county officers, as follows:

County judge from \$1500 to \$1800, treasurer \$1500 to \$1800, clerk \$2200 to \$2400, sheriff \$2400 to \$2500, assessor \$2200 to \$2400, school superintendent \$1700 to \$2000, and justice of the peace, South Lakeview district, \$900 to \$1500.

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—Sen. Marshall E. Cornett, Klamath Falls, wrote U. S. Sen. Rufus C. Holman today that Oregon's agricultural output in 1943 probably would be decreased because of shortage of labor and farm machinery.

Holman had sent Cornett the following telegram:

"Please advise me to what extent you think production of foodstuffs in Oregon may be reduced next year due to various requirements and conditions imposed by Roosevelt administration, which cannot be met by farmers. Your views and recommendations on this vital subject will be most helpful to me."

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—Sen. Coe A. McKenna, Portland, vice chairman of the senate assessment and taxation committee, outlined his tax program to his fellow committee members today.

McKenna wants:

A sales tax to produce between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000 a year, a 40-mill property tax limit, a flat personal income tax rate of 3 per cent instead of the existing 2 to 8 per cent rate, a flat 5 per cent corporation income tax rate instead of the present 8 per cent tax, elimination of the tax on unearned income, and reduction of the gift and inheritance taxes.

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—The first public hearing of the legislature will be held next Wednesday afternoon or evening on the bill to permit bigger trucks to operate on state highways, the house roads and highways committee said today.

The highway commission adopted a temporary order last June to allow bigger trucks, and the bill would make this order permanent. It would permit the increase of maximum truck length and weight from 50 feet and 54,000 pounds to 60 feet and 68,000 pounds.

The Association of Oregon counties will fight the bill, as will the railroads. A similar bill was defeated last session.

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—The Oregon state guard, which would have gone out of existence today, got a new lease on life at 3 p. m. yesterday when Governor Earl Snell signed a bill to keep the guard in service until he proclaims it is no longer needed.

### Governor, Not County Courts, to Name Justices

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today that the governor, and not county courts, has the power to make temporary appointments to succeed justices of the peace who have entered military service.

In two other opinions, both applying to the city of Portland, he held that the state board of health has no jurisdiction over trailer housing units operated by the federal housing authority, and that a city may not pass a health ordinance regulating establishments which already are regulated by state law.

### Highway Commission Discontinues Daily Reports on Roads

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—The state highway commission announced today it has discontinued its daily reports of conditions of state highways.

The commission said it did so in response to a request by military authorities, who said reports of closed roads give vital military information to the enemy, and because the service no longer is necessary because of reduction in travel.

## PLASTIC PLANE PREDICTED FOR POST-WAR USE

BALTIMORE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Can you imagine backing your plastic helicopter out of the garage some Sunday morning, taking your family for a spin above the countryside, and then, on your way home, stopping at a "roadside" stand to eat hot dogs?

It sounds like a pipe dream, especially now, when the old family jalopy stays in the garage most of the time.

After the War

However, William A. Safka, design engineer on plastics of the Glenn L. Marlin Aircraft company and instructor at the Plastic Industries' Technical Institute, predicts that "some day a plastic helicopter will be in every garage."

Here's his idea of the "family plane" of the post-war era:

This "airmobile" will be constructed largely of plastic materials one-fifth as heavy as the materials used in present-day passenger planes, but will have a tensile strength greater than steel.

**Maneuverable**

You will be able to order your helicopter in any color and shade your wife selects, and it will be fade, rust and dent-proof.

It will cost about \$1200 and fly for six miles on a gallon of gasoline.

It will be more maneuverable than present-day automobiles. It will contain safety devices making it practically foolproof. The size of an automobile, the helicopter will be able to park in any space an automobile can back into.

### Army Scraps Brass Buttons—Brass Hats Untouched

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—The army is scrapping its brass buttons but, Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson said today, "there doesn't seem to be any saving of brass in brass hats."

Patterson made the remark in telling a press conference that substitution of plastic for brass in uniform buttons is expected to save 365,000 pounds of the metal this year.

"Incidentally," he said, "brass hat" in the last war meant only a staff officer. What it means now, I'll leave to you."
