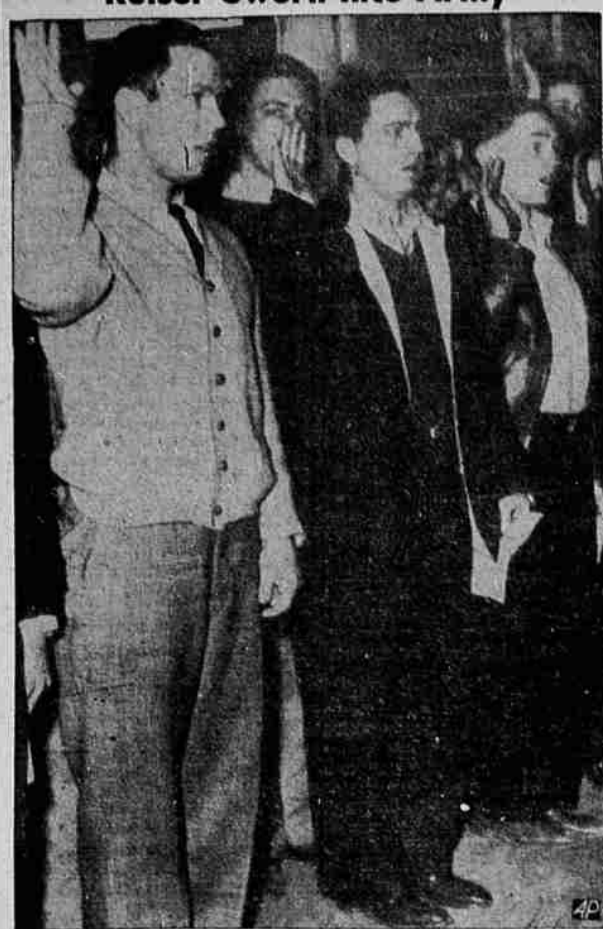

But we had fast backs to carry the ball—Dippy Evans, Jerry Cowhig and Creighton Miller. Material like that practically dictated the 'T'. It was hard, changing over, but we were satisfied."

### Four Coast Hoop Teams Go Into Action Tonight

### Huskies Meet Webfeet; Whitewashed Washington Staters Take on Idaho

SEATTLE, Jan. 22 (AP)—Four northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball teams will go into action tonight in games which will resolve the currently jumbled early season pattern of the league. Most important clash will see the powerful and fast University of Washington Huskies opposing the University of Oregon cagers, now at the top of the division heap. These two teams meet again Saturday night. At Moscow Washington State college takes on the University of Idaho, as yet unable to score a conference victory.

The Huskies bounded back in the second game to split their first series with Oregon State, last year's Pacific coast champions and are hot to wrest the league lead from the Oregon university five tonight and tomorrow. Coach Howard Hobson of Oregon expressed satisfaction with his team's late workouts yesterday and said that chances were good to upset the vaunted Huskies.

The Webfoot starting lineup was still undecided, but observers predicted Hobson would open with Captain Don Kirsch and Warren Taylor, senior lettermen; Bob Wren and Bob Newland, junior letter winners, and Roger Wiley, towering freshman center. At Pullman Coach Jack Friel of Washington State college Cougars said he would start Phil Mahan in place of Al Akins at guard, saving Akins to replace Captain Owen Hunt who, Friel said, probably would not be able to last out much of the game because of a recent illness. The Idaho game is a single engagement.

### Top Bowlers In Petersen Classic Meet

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—The nation's crack bowlers—with league averages of 185 and better—start shooting tomorrow in the 29th annual Petersen individual classic, the game's richest tournament. With a record entry of 832, cash awards will total \$20,800, and the top kegler after eight games will pocket \$4000. Two squads of 32 men, bowling eight games across 16 alleys, will start the tournament with the remaining 24 squads competing during the nine-day period ending January 31. A diamond studded medal goes with the \$4000 cash award, while runner-up will get \$2000 and third high bowler \$1000.

### Japs Abolish Baseball to End Customs

Educational authorities in Aichi Prefecture of Japan have abolished baseball as a means of putting an end to "hardly sportsmanlike" customs introduced from America, it was reported today in a Tokyo dispatch broadcast by the Berlin radio and recorded by the Associated Press. Nagoya, one of Japan's great industrial cities and a hotbed of baseball, is in Aichi Prefecture. Nagoya college and semi-pro teams have been among the best in Japan.

The educational department thereby hopes to put an end to hardly sportsmanlike customs which had come from America, as for instance preferential treatment accorded to members of such baseball teams by university authorities," the Berlin broadcast said.

### Brooklyn Starts Mass Production

George Sisler Kingpin in Dodgers Mass Production Baseball Player System

NEW YORK, Jan. 22 (AP)—A system for mass production of ball players will be undertaken by the Brooklyn Dodgers this year in spite of the war—and George Sisler, one of baseball's great all-time first basemen, is to be a kingpin in the setup.

Branch Rickey, president of the Dodgers, explained the plan yesterday at a press conference and said that Sisler, who is commissioner of the National Semi-Pro Baseball congress would become a Brooklyn scout to lead the search for talent among the sandloters.

The plan calls for conducting camps and baseball schools throughout the country in a manner similar to the program Rickey installed with great success for the St. Louis Cardinals.

"It is absolutely opposed to the process of reducing scouting staffs which most clubs are doing," he elaborated, "although it is understandable why clubs which have confined their scouting to the minor leagues would need fewer scouts now. There will be fewer minor leagues.

### Hawkeyes to Try Stopping Indiana Men

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—After two crushing defeats by Illinois, the Iowa Hawkeyes will attempt to make amends Saturday and Monday on their home floor by becoming the first team this season to paste the tag of defeat on Indiana.

That's quite an assignment, for the Hoosiers are regarded as the biggest threat to Illinois' Big Ten championship this year. After mapping 10 straight victories, three in conference play, Indiana remains the only major unbeaten quintet in the midwest with the exception of Notre Dame.

### Golden Glover Gives Weight Nod to Savold

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—Nate Bolden, a Chicago golden gloves champion in 1937, will give up about 20 pounds tonight in his 10-round fight with Lee Savold, 194, of Paterson, N. J., sixth ranking challenger for a crack at Sgt. Joe Louis' heavyweight title.

In two other 10-round heavyweight fights, Pat Comiskey, giant stablemate of Savold, will make his Chicago debut against Clayton Worlds, 6 foot 4-inch former Chicago golden gloves title, and Lem Franklin will meet Altus Allen.
