BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Jan. 22 (AP-USDA) An announcement by Rep. Fisher of Texas that the government would purchase the 1943 domestic wool clip was the center of interest in the Boston wool market today. The purchasing of the wool, he stated, would be under the supervision of the food distribution administration. An auction sale of 12,494 bales of Australian wool was held in Boston. Of the first two million pounds of wool offered, opening bids at ceiling were made by several bidders, and the purchaser was determined by drawing of cards.

DAIRYMEN SEE RUIN UNLESS ACTION TAKEN

PORTLAND, Jan. 22 (P) - Dairymen at a fact finding inquiry said Wednesday night they would ultimately be forced out of business unless milk and butter prices are increased or ceilings placed on labor and feed costs. Also in attendance were distributors, retailers, wholesalers, county agents, milk products manufacturers and representatives of the department of agriculture. Testimony given at the session will be sent to the secretary of agriculture.

Manpower, Feed Blamed

A drop of 25 per cent in milk production in this area under 1942 was predicted in the face of an estimated population gain of 30 per cent. Manpower and feed were blamed. Dairymen pointed out that much of their help is inefficient, that a milkster who formerly got \$65 to \$85 a month and his keep now gets \$125 to \$140, and that hay has risen from \$18 a ton to \$34 and \$35.

Subsidy Talked

Portland milk prices must be upped to at least 18 cents a quart if a fast-approaching shortage is to be even slightly delayed, it was decided. Any man who wants to can work for high wages and pay 16 cents for milk, one of the group said. There was some discussion of a subsidy system similar to the food stamp plan for the man who doesn't make high wages.

PRICE LIFT OKED FOR LOG DISTRICTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP) - The office of price administration today authorized higher price maximums for lower grades of logs produced in three districts of Washington and Oregon and described the action as designed to stimulate logging operations.

The order will result in an increase of \$2 per thousand feet log scale in the ceiling for No. 2 grades and lower in the Columbia river district, a \$1 increase for the Willapa Bay-Grays Harbor district in Washington and \$3.50 for a part of the Willamette valley district brought into the Columbia river district.

The increase for logs in the remainder of the Willamette valley district now defined as the southern Oregon-Tillamook district is about \$1.50. The same order authorized an increase of \$1 per thousand in the price of No. 1 sawmill and peeler grades of logs for the Columbia river district.

This district was extended to include the area north of Land county, Ore., except Lincoln and Tillamook counties.

INDUSTRIALS KEEP RECOVERY LIGHTS GOING

NEW YORK, Jan. 22 (P) - Support for assorted industrials, mainly blue chips, kept recovery lights burning in today's stock market although profit taking cast shadows on many recent climbers.

Top gains ran to 2 points or so. Rails, steels and motors backed water and, in the final hour, prices were moderately mixed. Transfers were around 1,000,000 shares.

War news, investment demand and mild inflation sentiment again served as the principal bolstering influence.

Notwithstanding uneven tendencies toward the last, many favorites posted new peaks for 1942-43. These included Oliver Farm, Deere, Montgomery Ward, International Nickel, Air Reduction, American Can, Westinghouse, General Electric, Dow Chemical, Allied Chemical and Pepsi-Cola.

WHEAT CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (P) - Wheat and other grains advanced today following unanimous approval by the house agricultural committee of a bill to revise parity prices upward.

Gains in the wheat pit ranged to about 2 cents at times as hasty covering by shorts, coupled with a little mill buying, found the market bear of offerings. Rye forged ahead sharply and traders said considerable new buying entered that pit.

The house committee approved a bill which would include farm labor costs in computing parity. Committee Chairman Fulmer (D-S.C.) said he would try to have the legislation brought before the house at an early date.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c higher, May \$1.39 1/2, July \$1.39 1/2, corn was up 1-1/2c, May 98 1/2c, oats advanced 1-1/2c, rye rose 1-2c and soybeans closed 1c lower.
