Army Reserve Opened Up to 17-Year-Olds

PORTLAND, Jan. 26 (AP)—Col. J. J. Fulmer, commander of army recruiting in Oregon, said today that the army's reserve is open to 17-year-olds.

Boys who enlist under this status will be eligible for calls to active duty within six months following their 18th birthday, he said.

Authority for this type enlistment is the first since Civil War times, the colonel said.
