STOCK PRICES DROP IN WAKE OF WAR NEWS

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (P)—Stock prices turned downward today in the wake of announcement of the major allied war conference in French North Africa.

Profit cashing on recent advances accounted for much of the selling in the face of the dramatic news, brokers said, while there was disappointment over the lack of more immediate and tangible results from the Casablanca meeting.

The list was uneasy from the start and slipped in moderately good volume until, about midday, a few recovery attempts were made. Leaders took on a more resistant tone and going into the final hour had succeeded in trimming losses that at times ranged to around two points. Transfers for the full session aggregated 1,027,160 for the second million share day of the year.

WHEAT
CHICAGO, Jan. 27 (P)—A small amount of selling pressure was sufficient to send wheat prices down for fractional losses today, but other grains mainly held around the preceding session's close for most of the day. Traders said mill buying of wheat was small and reports indicated a slow demand for flour. With grain men watching possible government developments to control wheat prices, traders adopted a cautious attitude toward futures.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c lower, May \$1.39 1/4, July \$1.39 1/4; corn was unchanged to 1/4c higher, May 98 1/4c; oats were unchanged to 1/4c lower, and rye dropped 1-1/2c. May soybeans, untraded yesterday, closed at \$1.84.

BANK READY TO TAKE PART IN RATION BANKING

G. C. Blohm, manager of the local branch of the United States National bank, announced Wednesday that facilities are ready for doing the bank's part in the nationwide ration banking plan which becomes effective today.

The United States National bank is one of 18,000 commercial banks in the country which will cooperate with the office of price administration in collecting and accounting for the ultimate disposition of coupons and other tokens used under the rationing program.

System Clarified
Retailers, with the exception of gasoline, doing business on a large scale would find it burdensome to pass on ration coupons or stamps received from the consumer to the wholesaler or other supplier every time they want to replenish their stock of sugar or coffee. Likewise, the wholesaler or other middleman would find it burdensome to pass on the coupons or stamps they would receive from innumerable retailers to producers or others who supply them with the stock.

The ration banking plan will enable these various classes or groups of food suppliers to bulk the coupons or stamps they have received from their customers in a bank account or accounts in terms of "pounds" similar to the usual practice of banking "dollars."

Required
The food wholesaler, jobber or other middleman, or retailer coming above certain volume will at the present open two ration bank accounts at his bank, one for sugar and one for coffee; or if it is a wholesale distributor in gasoline, he opens a gasoline account, which, of course, would be in "gallons."

In sugar and coffee, primary distributors, wholesalers and retailers who had a gross volume of sales in food of \$5000 or more in December, 1942, as well as chain retailers will be positively required to open ration bank accounts. Retailers whose gross in December last was less than \$5000 may also do so if they find it to their advantage. Restaurants and other bulk users, likewise, may later open such accounts.

The eventual outcome of the war can be put on a mathematical basis. That will become evident to the Japanese people themselves when we strike at their own home islands and bomb them constantly from the air.—President Roosevelt.
