PENSIONS, BIG TRUCKS, TAXES IN SPOTLIGHT

SALEM, Jan. 27 (P)—Old age pensions, big trucks and corporation income taxes came into the legislative spotlight today, as both houses really started rolling and passed 21 bills.

Governor Earl Snell's proposal to make utilities pay the corporation excise tax in order to pay \$40 monthly old age pensions will be aired at a hearing tonight before the house taxation and revenue committee.

Truck Fight

State Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher said the tax would amount to 4 per cent of the profits of utilities, including power companies, railroad lines, telegraph and telephone companies, gas companies and water systems.

The old fight over permitting big trucks to operate on state highways and county roads began anew today, when the joint highway committees held a public hearing to permit the railroads and trucking companies to square off against each other.

The state highway commission is permitting trucks up to 60 feet long and 70,000 pounds in weight to use the highways as a war emergency measure, but after the war, the limits would go back to 50 feet and 54,000 pounds. The bill, sponsored by trucking interests, would keep the bigger truck limits after the war.

Another Battle

Opposed to the measure are the railroads, railroad unions, and the Association of Oregon Counties. A similar bill was defeated in the 1941 session.

Ammunition for another battle was provided today when employers introduced their unemployment compensation bill, and a labor immediately announced it would have one of its own.

The employers' bill would keep the present payroll taxes, which employers pay, at 1 to 2.7 per cent of payrolls, based only on their own employment experience. But the bill would abolish any possibility of returning

to penalty rates, or rates of 2.7 to 4 per cent, which are charged against employers whose employment is unstable.

The employers abandoned their proposal to try to get the minimum rate cut from 1 to 1/2 of 1 per cent.

Kelley Lee, public relations counsel for the State Federation of Labor, said his organization would draft a bill to freeze all payroll taxes at 2.7 per cent.

Lumber Worker Critically Hurt

ROSEBURG, Jan. 27 (P)—Ben Jacoby, Looking Glass resident, was in Mercy hospital here today suffering from burns, concussion and internal injuries resulting from an accident at the Bryson Timber company mill at Sutherlin.

Jacoby was injured while engaged in work on a lumber conveyor. A piece of machinery fell, striking him across the body and knocking him unconscious. He fell into a refuse burner and suffered severe leg burns before being rescued. His condition was reported to be critical.

Maximum Prices On Anti-Freeze Substitutes Cut

PORTLAND, Jan. 27 (P)—The state OPA announced today that maximum prices on anti-freeze substitutes have been reduced.

Prices of the salt base solutions have been brought down from levels as high as \$2.65 a gallon to 75 and 85 cents, the OPA said. The solutions made from naphtha and kerosene which had sold for as high as \$1.50 a gallon, were reduced to 35 and 43 cents.

The OPA ruled that these petroleum distillates must be plainly labeled and carry a warning that the solution may cause the motor to overheat and melt rubber connections.

SALVAGED NYLON, SILK SHIPPED OUT

Four huge cartons, containing more than 150 pounds of silk, rayon and nylon, have been shipped out of Klamath Falls by Sears Roebuck and company as a result of the drive to collect old stockings, lingerie, etc., containing these critical materials. The materials were shipped east where they will be processed and used in powder bags.

Ron Fisher, who heads the drive for Sears, says that the collection is still on, and that the receptacles will be kept in the store. Any garment containing silk, rayon or nylon, which has been laundered, is acceptable, he said.
