

TOWER GUARDS KILL 1, WOUND TWO IN BREAK

WAUPUN, Wis., Jan. 29 (AP)—Straight-shooting tower guards killed one man and wounded two others today to frustrate the attempted escape of four young convicts from the Wisconsin State prison at Waupun.

The fourth man escaped injury and got over the 22-foot west wall but was tracked to a private garage four blocks from the penitentiary. Guards found him hiding under an automobile.

May Recover
The convict killed was Frank (Bigfoot) Koplar, 23, of Milwaukee, who was serving three to thirteen years for burglary, second offense. He was hit above the hip, the bullet ranging upward into his body.

Charles Bennett, 22, sentenced from Marinette last November 9 for one to fifteen years for kidnaping and armed robbery, was shot in the head, but was given a chance to recover.

Recaptured
Wendell Fowler, 22, of Los Angeles, convicted in Milwaukee in July, 1941, as an accessory before the fact of theft, was wounded in the thigh. He is serving a one to four and one-half year term. Fowler, prison records showed, had several terms in the Nebraska, state reformatory and the Wyoming state prison.

Raymond Ramazini, 26, of Milwaukee, serving one to 12 years for assault with intent to do great bodily harm, cleared the wall, but was recaptured.

Switch Pulled
Deputy Warden W. J. Hinkamp said the four made their break immediately upon arriving at the prison shoe and tailor shops after breakfast.

One man pulled the electric switch, plunging both buildings into darkness.

SOLONS ASK LEND-LEASE ACCOUNTING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—American lend-lease aid has made the British Isles "an impregnable base for offensive operations," Edward R. Stettinius told congress today.

Stettinius, lend-lease administrator, asked continuance of lend-lease until July 1944.

In testimony before the house foreign affairs committee, Stettinius said a large part of the North African campaign and the Middle East, Italian Africa, Syria and Madagascar offensives stemmed from the British Isles.

Passage Assured
He related that the program was resulting in supply by other United Nations of food, munitions, services, barracks and transportation to United States troops stationed in them, as well as making American weapons of war available to Britain, China, Russia and this nation's other allies.

Passage of legislation to extend the act appeared certain, as republican leaders in congress have declared they would not oppose continuance of an act which has provided billions of dollars worth of aid to others of the United Nations, but there were demands for a detailed accounting of how the program is being carried out.

Powder Puffs Shipped?
Rep. Jones (R-Ohio) only yesterday raised on the house floor a few of the questions upon which attention will be focused in the coming debate.

He contended that "thousands of cases of beer, rayon stockings, and powderpuffs" had been shipped abroad and paid for by lend-lease money. Moreover, he maintained on the basis of "reliable information" that some of the shipments went to private persons.

Lend-lease officials promptly denied his statements concerning beer and powderpuffs. As to the rayon hose, they said they were compelled to buy a small quantity in order to obtain a supply of cotton stockings requested by Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for distribution to civilians in North Africa. The warehouses holding the cotton stockings, they said, insisted that lend-lease also clear out their rayon hose.
