## CE SOCIETIES WILL PRESENT SPECIAL HOUR

At the First Presbyterian church during the Sunday vespers hour at 5 o'clock, the three Christian Endeavor societies will present a special program commemorating the founding of the first society in the Williston Congregational church, Portland, Maine, by the Rev. and Mrs. Francis E. Clark on February 2, 1881. Robert A. Alexander is in charge.

The program opens with Christian Endeavor songs, the pastor giving the invocation. The presiding officer will give a brief history of Christian Endeavor, which has become one of the worldwide movements of Christianity.

The intermediate Christian Endeavor with Mrs. Ralph S. Henry as superintendent, will give "The Why of Missions," in which Marylou Case, Shirley Damon, Karen Kohler, Nancy Edwards, Clarice Berg, Walter Gwin and Charles Denison will participate.

The Senior and Young People's Christian Endeavor, John Fletcher in charge, will present Christian Endeavor stewardship in a Rainbow service. "The Stewardship of Time" is Stanley Hendricks' subject. "The Stewardship of Strength" is Jim Denison's subject. "The Stewardship of Personality" is the topic given Betty Hopkins. Myrtle Russell will speak on "The Stewardship of Talents." Lillian Baker will speak on "The Stewardship of Possessions and Money." Frank Nott will speak on "The Stewardship of Prayer" and Dorris Yantla "The Stewardship of Life." There will be several special musical numbers, including duets by Mrs. T. G. Newman and Mrs. Guy Merrill, solos by Mrs. Bert C. Thomas, Ruth Henry and Stephen Stone.

The young people are presenting the church with 100 special hymns. Frank Nott is to make the presentation in the name of the societies and Thor G. Newman will receive the books in the name of the congregation and dedicate them with prayer.
