NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (AP)—Industrial, with steels conspicuous, took charge of the climbing forces in today's stock market and many favorites touched new highs for 15 months or longer on the largest volume for the year to date.
Bullish inspiration again was ascribed mainly to the war news, investment demand and a slight touch of inflationary temperature. Gains ran to around 20 points at the best. These were trimmed here and there in the final hour and scattered losers were in evidence. Transfers were about 1,200,000 shares. Bonds maintained their equilibrium.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29 (AP)—Hops were firm today on the hopes of traders that the congressional farm bloc will resist any attempt to place ceilings on wheat at below parity prices.
Trading was light in most pits, although more activity developed in corn than has been the case in recent sessions. Corn futures advanced small fractions as weather conditions made movement to markets unfavorable.
Wheat closed 1-1c higher, May \$1.39 1/2, July \$1.39 1/2, corn was 1-1c up, May 98 1/2, oats advanced 1-1c, rye jumped 1-1 1/2c and soybeans were inactive.

PINE PRODUCTION DROPS FOR WEEK

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29 (AP)—Production of pine lumber dropped off approximately one-third during the week ending January 23 and shipments and orders also were down, the Western Pine association reported today.
With the lumber industry paralyzed from heavy snow and cold, production totaled only 33,828,000 board feet, as compared with 50,110,000 for the previous week and 45,374,000 for the corresponding week last year.
Similar comparisons of shipments and orders were 49,096,000; 82,072,000; 73,655,000 and 57,400,000; 61,376,000; 95,893,000.

FARMERS PROMISED HIGHER PRICES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—The government yesterday guaranteed farmers higher prices this year for tomato, pea, sweet corn and snap bean canning crops, but promised that consumer prices of the canned products would be held at approximately present levels.
Under a program designed to encourage greater production of these crops, the agriculture department announced it would buy these canned vegetables from canners at prices which would enable them to pay farmers specified minimum prices. These minimum prices will be higher than were paid last year, it said.

The department plans to sell the canned goods back to canners at a discount and at prices which would permit their distribution under retail ceiling prices little if any higher than now prevail. The difference, which would in effect be a subsidy, will be borne by the department.
Officials said canned tomatoes, peas, sweet corn and snap beans would be major commodities on the list of canned goods to be rationed later.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Jan. 29 (AP-USA)—Scoured Texas lambs' wool of poor color was sold at a price of \$1.08 today. Spot Australian 64s combing wools were sold at a bond price of \$1.08 out of a clean. Some demand for Australian 64s top for serite had a firming effect on price. Sales were made in moderate volume at \$1.36.
