He was wounded in battle and received the Distinguished Service Cross for action under fire. He later served as a staff member of the American Peace delegation to Paris in 1919, and has been professor of government at the University of Nebraska and Reed college faculties for the past twenty-two years. He is an authority on problems of war and peace, and an arbitrator for labor and management.
