Songs for this period are, Mrs. Hillis, in costume, "Oh, You Beautiful Doll"; Mrs. Vernon Kuykendall, "In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree" and "In the Light of the Silvery Moon"; Miss Joy Kent, "Shine On, Harvest Moon" and "Come Away With Me, Lucille."

1776—A tableau showing Betsy Ross impersonated by Dorothy Collier, sewing on the flag which General Washington ordered, surrounded by the following members of Eulalona chapter, DAR, in colonial costumes: Mrs. H. A. Nitschelm, Mrs. Sydney Evans, Mrs. Wilbur Jones, Mrs. Robert Wattenburg, Mrs. Thomas, Mrs. J. C. Williamson, and Miss West.

Miss Eileen Cornell, dressed as Liberty, will lead in the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner." This will close the program which will be of appeal to all interested in historical matters, especially those who enjoy seeing early day costumes, and hearing the songs of long ago.

Latin-American Exhibit Slated for Church Women's Meet

The Klamath Falls Council of Church Women will meet in the new library room of Klamath Union high school Tuesday, February second from two to four o'clock. This is room 304 on the third floor.

There will be a short business meeting after which an opportunity will be given to view and study the Latin-American exhibit on display in the library.

One of the chief aims of the administration at Washington is to foster understanding between the Americas and help promote inter-American solidarity. To this end the library service division of the United States office of education, in co-operation with the office of the co-ordinator of inter-American affairs, is offering to circulate to any school for a period of two weeks the 150 traveling loan exhibits of Latin-American teaching materials.

One of these exhibits has been secured by Miss Virginia West, Spanish teacher of the high school.

Some of the many things contained in this exhibit are books and pamphlets on the Latin-American; handicraft including textiles, baskets, pottery, decorated gourds, and similar objects which are used in the daily life of Latin-America; panels which show ancient musical instruments, a Peruvian mummy and sample of mummy cloth, a portrait of Simon Bolivar; flags, maps, posters and charts giving much information of the Latin-American countries.

As the study groups in the various churches are studying Latin America they will appreciate this opportunity of seeing this exhibit for both its interest and educational value.
