

LIQUOR STORE SALES HERE LEAD STATE

Klamath's state liquor store sales exceeded those of any other state store in Oregon outside of Portland, it is shown in a 1942 Oregon state liquor control commission report received here this week.

The Klamath sales hit a high of \$516,489.45. Three Portland stores reported sales exceeding that amount.

Cost \$336,572
Sales from some of the other larger cities in the state are: Medford, \$338,615.45; Eugene, \$446,742.20; Salem, \$385,882.60; Bend, \$170,925.15; Astoria, \$388,555.25.

The liquor sold through the Klamath Falls store cost the commission \$336,572.86. Freight charges amounted to \$5747.19, making a gross profit of \$174,169.40, or 33.72 per cent.

Operating expense of the Klamath store was \$17,621.19, and other pro-rated expenses here amounted to \$2330.30. This left a net profit of \$158,877.91, or 30.76 per cent.

Here are the 1942 sales figures for various agencies in or near Klamath county:

Lapine, \$23,469.05; Paisley, \$8022.90; Bly, \$32,559.55; Lakeview, \$87,200.20; Chemult, \$8331.25; Bonanza, \$12,322.75; Merrill, \$25,972.20; Malin, \$14,476.55; Fort Klamath, \$29,978.70.

In accordance with legislative action, all net revenues of the state liquor control commission, above working capital, must be turned over to the state public assistance fund.

Klamath county, while its sales are greater than those of other counties, does not get so much back for public assistance as counties with much smaller sales. Klamath's return for public assistance is \$57,229.80, while nearby Jackson, with smaller sales, gets \$99,773.33. Lane, with smaller sales, claims \$137,997.76 for welfare, or about \$100,000 more than comes back to Klamath Falls.

"Wait, wait, don't start..." Thinking he had a message, they waited until he hung up. He strolled back and remarked:

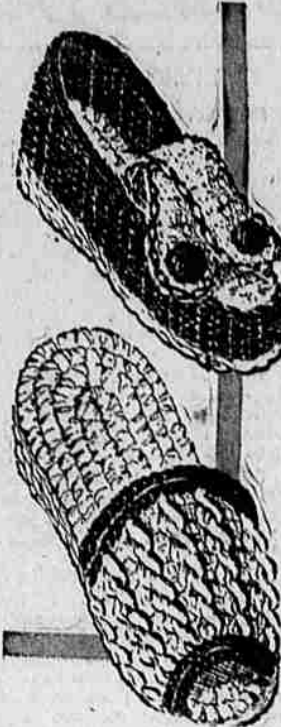

"CAVALRYMEN OF THE SEA" HONORED

KANEHOE NAVAL AIR STATION, Hawaii, Jan. 13 (Delayed) (AP)—Seventeen "modern cavalrymen of the sea"—members of the fleet's flying patrol boats—were decorated for valor today by Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox.

"Everyone in the navy," said Secretary Knox, "appreciates the great job that is being done by the patrol wings."

"But I hold a particularly warm regard for them, because I was a cavalry officer in previous wars. I regard the patrol wings as the navy's modern cavalry of the sea."

Awards included:

A silver star medal to Almon F. Gillett, boatswain's mate, of Prairie City, Ore., who as a member of a boat crew detailed to rescue survivors of the burning US carrier Lexington in the Coral sea last May 8, made repeated trips to the side of the vessel under a hail of flaming debris caused by exploding bombs and gasoline.

SWIFT COMPANY HAS BUSY YEAR

"Keep 'Em Fed," was the motto Swift and company lived up to in 1942, the organization's busiest year, according to John Holmes, president, in a special report to company employees released here today by L. E. Mead, manager of the local Swift house.

"We are doing everything possible to keep meat and other food products moving in this area. As Holmes points out, production of livestock in accordance with goals announced for 1943 will require even greater effort this year."

Principal reason for the increased volume of work is the need for food as a weapon of war, the report makes clear.

"More and more food," said Holmes, "is needed to keep our armed forces the best in the world. Moreover, great quantities of food are being shipped abroad under the lend-lease program."

"But that is not the full story. Workers in other industries and their families are also demanding more and more food. They need strength-sustaining foods to keep them at work building planes, tanks, ships, guns and the other implements of war. Meat, as always, stands in the top position as the backbone of the meal and as the principal body-building food."
