DR. KINNAMAN WILL FINISH SERIES HERE

Dr. Kinnaman, world-famous Biblical archeologist, will bring the closing lectures of the current meetings at the Sunday services at the Klamath Temple church, 1007 Pine street. To an interested audience Thursday, Dr. Kinnaman spoke of the findings of archeologists in "Trailing of the Exodus" from "Egypt to the Land of Promise."

Friday night he will speak on "Daniel in the Lions' Den," when he describes unearthing the den into which Daniel was thrown. At 11 a. m. Sunday, Dr. Kinnaman will speak on the subject, "Jesus On Trial Today," at 7:30 p. m., "King Tut and His Relation to the Bible." Dr. Kinnaman will give his personal testimony of how 22 archeologists entered the tomb of King Tutankhamen in 1922. He is one of the two living that survived the curse. The pastor states that the present series of special meetings has been one of the most beneficial ever undertaken by the local church. He says that Dr. Kinnaman's ministry has enriched the understanding of the word of God of the church, and has reached out to hundreds of families and homes.

REV. O. C. KELLER TO START SERVICE
