

LOGGERS NOW IN ARMY MAY BE DISMISSED

SEATTLE, Feb. 15 (P)—Army enlisted men still in the United States whose prior employment was in the west coast lumber industry and who will reach their 38th birthday by February 28 may be discharged to resume work in the western woods and sawmills, the West Coast Lumbermen's association has learned.

"The army has decided that a large number of enlisted men in the 38-plus age group can give greater service in their civilian jobs than in uniform," an announcement yesterday said. "Cooperation by forest industry companies and by families of soldiers covered by the program will be cooperation with the army."

LOCAL MOTORISTS HAVE CLEAN RECORD

Klamath county motorists are cooperating, according to Sergeant E. W. Tichenor of state police, who ordered a traffic check of 700 vehicles Saturday, one check on South Sixth street, the other in the Chiloquin area.

Of the 700 cars, checked for vehicular licenses, drivers' licenses, federal tax stamps and registration cards, only 13 were found lacking. Eleven arrests were made on South Sixth, three in the Chiloquin districts for no operator's or vehicular licenses.

During the check, state police arrested Daryl William Hoyce, Chiloquin, on a charge of driving while under the influence of liquor. Hoyce appeared before Justice of the Peace Blaine Stinson and was fined \$100 and 50 days in jail, 40 days suspended on payment of fine.

COLD WAVE HITS EASTERN BOARD

New England and the middle Atlantic states were in the grip, red-nosed and watery-eyed, of a record-breaking cold wave today (Monday).

Sub-zero temperatures, many of them breaking all-time records, were recorded. Early reports indicated Watertown, N. Y., hit the jack-pot with an official 35 below, but Ogdensburg, Warrensburg and Gloversville, N. J., were not far behind with, respectively, 34, 35 and 32 below zero.

New York City was shivering with a low of 7 below, a record for the date. Boston had an official -14, and Hartford chalked up -12.

A biting wind nipped ears and fingers.

Schools in many communities were closed, primarily as fuel conservation measures.

Trail of Apple Cores Lead to Burglary Solution

CANYON CITY, Feb. 15 (P)—A trail of apple cores and orange peelings along the Ochoco highway led Sheriff I. B. Hazeltine to the solution of a service station burglary at the junction of the John Day and Ochoco highways.

Apples and oranges were among commodities taken from the station and the sheriff's only clue was the cores and peelings. Inquiring along the route he finally pieced descriptions of two young men who were seen hitchhiking that way. He telephoned to Mitchell authorities who arrested Lee Ray Howard, 18, Till City, Ind., and Charles E. Burchett, 19, Otway, Ohio.

They admitted the holdup to Justice of the Peace Charles Mack here and were sentenced to six months in jail and paroled, then turned over to the U. S. marshal who said they were wanted for selective service violations.

Flax Ban Hits Sports Fishermen, String Business

PORTLAND, Feb. 15 (P)—Details of an order banning flax for non-essential civilian purposes were announced today by the office of war information here.

One effect is to remove flax completely from production of fish lines used by sportsmen.

The war production board permits raw flax, hatched flax, hatching machine tow, tossed flax and flax pullings to be used or sold only for the following purposes:

Orders for the armed forces; orders with A-10 ratings or higher except for raw flax and hatched flax which require A-1-J ratings; hose yarn for fire-fighting use; shoe thread for repairing shoes and harness sack sewing twine for grain sacks; fish nets and other fishing gear for commercial fishing.

4300 POTATO ACREAGE QUOTA SET FOR MODOC

TULELAKE—A potato acreage quota of 4300 acres for Modoc county in 1943 has been set by the federal government, with the same quota for Siskiyou county, it was announced by Chester J. Main, president of the Tulelake Growers at a meeting of the Tulelake-Modoc Farm Center. Individual quotas have been mailed to growers.

**Exceptions Seen
ON 48-HOUR WEEK**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (P)—Manpower Commissioner McNutt promised today he would provide for exceptions to the 48-hour minimum work week to protect those unable to meet such a schedule because of special circumstances.

He declined to reveal what the exceptions would be, but told a press conference he would issue regulations "within two or three days" and agreed it would be advisable for employers in the 32 areas where the 48-hour-week has been ordered into immediate effect to await the new regulations before changing current schedules.

It was indicated the exceptions would be designed to cover cases of firms unable to cover on 48-hour schedules because of lack of materials or other circumstances beyond their control, and possibly those who employ so few that extension of their hours would not free any workers for essential tasks.

AIR ENLISTMENTS OPEN TO YOUTHS

According to information received by Sergeant Frank J. Huhin, commander of the local army recruiting office, authority has been received from the war department to accept applications for aviation cadet training from young men who have reached their 17th birthday but have not passed their 18th. These applicants will be placed in the air force enlisted reserve and will not be called for training until they have reached their 18th birthday.

Applications are also being accepted for enlistment in the enlisted reserve corps from the same group of young men. Successful applicants for this type of service will also be allowed to remain at home until their 18th birthday and will then be assigned to the branch of service for which they are best fitted.

Washington Denies Agreement to Scrap Rubber Plants

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (P)—State department officials declared Saturday the United States has entered into no agreements with South America rubber-producing countries calling for the scrapping of U. S. synthetic rubber plants after the war.

William J. Hale, research consultant for the Dow Chemical company, had said in a Minneapolis speech that an unpublished trade treaty proposed with South American nations pledges the United States to post war dismantling of its synthetic factories.

Private, AWOL, Tries Suicide

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 15 (P)—Pvt. Ed Poole, who said he is AWOL from Fort Scott, Cal., tried to commit suicide here Sunday night by drinking a bottle of iodine. He became frightened, however, after drinking the fluid and called the police who took him to the hospital, according to Police Chief Carl Dallas.

The soldier, to be dismissed from the hospital today, is being held for military authorities. He gave his home address as Myrtle Point, Ore.

SHOES
February 8 to June 15 — Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
February 20—Retail sales of canned fruits and vegetables ends at midnight.
February 22 to 27—Registration for war ration book No. 2 at schools.
March 1—Rationing of canned and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables begins.

SUGAR
March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires.

COFFEE
March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 15 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
March 1—All "C" coupon books and most "B" cards must be renewed.
March 21—No. 4 stamps each good for four gallons expire at midnight.

TIRES
February 28—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to this date.
March 31—Cars with A books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle D books.

Army Men, Here to Buy Potatoes, Set Tuesday for Meet

Representatives of the army quartermaster corps, here to arrange for heavy purchases of Klamath potatoes for the armed forces, will meet with all growers of the basin at a gathering at the Merrill community hall at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday, it was announced Monday.

The meeting is for growers from all parts of the basin, including Tulelake and the Bonanza country. Dealers are also invited.

The army men said that a serious problem has arisen in supplying the army and navy with potatoes, and that actually the volume of potatoes left in this district is not enough to meet the needs of the armed forces. As a result, they said, the army finds it necessary to ask the farmers to sell their potatoes for armed force consumption.

Only No. 1 potatoes will be taken for this purpose, as most of the potatoes are shipped and the best quality only will stand up under shipping conditions.

1600 Loads Left

The quartermaster corps agents said they are asking for full cooperation by both growers and dealers.

It was estimated there are 1600 carloads of potatoes left in the district. Seed, dehydration stocks, and No. 2's will account for a large portion of this total, leaving a possible 500 carloads of No. 1 spuds for armed force use.

It was also stated that the army purchases will be made under OPA ceiling regulations.

The men here Monday included Major Paul E. Haines, quartermaster corps; George A. Bush, senior marketing specialist, quartermaster corps; John McMullen, associate marketing specialist.

CONVICTION REVIEW DENIED GANGSTERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (P)—The supreme court refused today to review the conviction of Louis (Lepke) Buchalter, Emanuel Weiss and Louis Capone, alleged members of "Murder, Inc." on a charge of slaying Joseph Rosen, a Brooklyn storekeeper.

The trio are under sentence to die at Sing Sing. A stay of execution was granted on December 5 by Supreme Court Justice Roberts to apply until the tribunal disposed of the petition for review of the conviction. The supreme court today vacated the stay order.

Buchalter, alleged racketeer, was said by the prosecution to have ordered his henchmen to kill Rosen because the storekeeper had threatened to testify in the Dewey investigation of racketeering.

"Buchalter's order was carried out by Weiss, Capone and others," asserted Thomas Craddock Hughes, acting district attorney of Kings county. "Weiss fired the shots, Capone planned the escape." Rosen was said to have been struck down by 22 bullets on September 13, 1936.
