LONDON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The RAF announced today that Flight Lieutenant Kenneth H. Burns, 30, born in Oregon (town unavailable), had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. The citation said Burns made a reconnaissance flight over the Italian arsenal city of Turin at a height of only 500 feet, and that in a raid on Berlin last month he released his bombs and then obtained a photograph of the city.

## SALARY BOOST FOR TEACHERS PASSES HOUSE

HARVEY, Jr. SALEM, Feb. 15 (AP)—Bills to legalize the state and county defense councils and to increase minimum salaries of public school teachers from \$765 to \$1200 per nine-month school year received house approval today and were sent to the senate. The defense bill, requested by Governor Earl Snell, would give the legislature's blessing to the state and county councils, which were created by proclamation by former governor Charles A. Sprague before the United States entered the war.

**Unanimous** It also would give added authority to the councils and the governor, who would be empowered to enforce dim-out regulations, prevent shooting of firearms, and prohibit the burning of slashings in forest areas.

Provision would be made for cities to assist each other in fighting fires caused by enemy attack. The bill was passed unanimously.

**80 Schools Closed** The teacher salary bill was passed 49 to 10. Rep. Burt K. Snyder, Lakeview, its sponsor, said the minimum salary would be the same as Washington's, and

be only \$120 a year less than California's. He said 80 Oregon schools have been closed in the past year because of the teacher shortage.

Many teachers have left school, he said, to take jobs in better-paying industry. The objectors to the bill contended that small districts could not afford the increase.
