

TAX CHANGES OPPOSED IN GRANGE VOTE

Going on record in opposition to any change in the state income tax laws, the Pomona grange at a well attended meeting Saturday at Shasta school voted two resolutions, both in opposition to tampering with the income tax structure at this time. The view expressed by those present was that owing to unsettled economic conditions it would be unwise to tamper with the state tax structure and adopt changes which might upset the flow of revenue which was looked upon as being fairly certain to produce sufficient taxes for state purposes.

The grange also went on record in opposition to tampering with the law voted by the people last November which provided for the diversion of surplus income tax funds for school purposes.

Henderson Speaks
The all-day session of the Pomona grange was presided over by Pomona Overseer Earl Webber in absence of Master Lewis Botens who could not attend on account of the illness of his wife.

During the lecturer's hour County Agent Henderson was the principle speaker. Henderson reviewed important matters requiring the attention and cooperation of farmers as their contribution to the war effort, especially completion of the sign up in the food for war program.

Eggs Talked
Considerable discussion centered on the egg and poultry situation, declared to be unsatisfactory. The adoption of some cooperative plan of marketing was urged by several present.

Harry Boyd, Pomona lecturer who is now living in Los Angeles, forwarded his resignation, and Fred Peterson, county school superintendent, was elected to fill out his term. Peterson was installed by L. Alva Lewis.

The women of Shasta View, Henley and Merrill served luncheon at noon, and received enthusiastic praise for the fine meal.

Bond Record
A collection was presented to USO in which the membership contributed.

Klamath Pomona grange has the distinction of having purchased more war bonds than its current income, and the subordinate granges of the county have practically all purchased war bonds in addition, it was said.

Marine Gives Vivid Picture Of Guadalcanal Battlefront

MARINE OUTPOST ON GUADALCANAL, Jan. 10 (Delayed)—The Japs are about 200 yards to the front of this machine gun nest and about 300 yards to the right, but these marines don't give a hoot.

Once in awhile one of them spots a new Jap emplacement, built during the night, and idly drops a few rounds into the position "just to keep 'em down." It is the only form of amusement the boys have had during their 28 days in the front lines.

Although we make a sizeable group, we're not bothered much save for an occasional shot over our heads by a Jap sniper. However, the boys keep their ears cocked for knee mortars, which throw a high explosive shell with a great deal of accuracy.

Since I'm comparatively fresh from the states, the boys are plying me with questions about home, particularly the latest song hits. They've never heard

"Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition" or "White Christmas," which were coming into popularity when my outfit started across the Pacific.

These boys are closer to each other than brothers. There's Private First Class John Manning of Indiana Harbor, Ind.; Private John Mahrting of Loveland, Calif.; Private Floyd Simmons of Tampa, Fla., and Lieut. Frank Morrums of Long Creek, Ore.

Over on the left a company has started a small war. We watch as the outfit crosses an exposed ridge and disappears into the woods. From the chatter of their machine guns and automatic rifles, we know they've met opposition. "That's a trigger-happy bunch," Manning observes casually.

I notice a piece of V-mail in the grass. "This is just to carry my love to you and assure you of my prayers," it says. "Can you send me a picture of yourself sometime?" I wonder if the boy had a chance to fulfill the request.

Guard Men Here Aid in Formation of Lake Unit

On Saturday, February 6, two captains and four lieutenants representing the commissioned officers of the two state guard companies in Klamath Falls drove to Lakeview to attend a meeting to organize a company there. Forty-four men enlisted. With the interest shown at this initial meeting there is no doubt but what Lake county will soon be represented by a company of 100 men.

It has long been the desire of the commander of the state guards to organize a battalion in this corner of the state with Lakeview providing one of the companies. Efforts to form a company in Lakeview were unsuccessful for some time and it was through the efforts of the Lions club of Lakeview and Jack V. Briscoe, automobile dealer there, that the meeting was held. The Lions, after learning through Briscoe that our state

defense contemplated a company at Lakeview, appointed a committee and arranged details for the meeting.

A large portion of that club enlisted along with other residents of Lakeview. As is always the case, men in all walks of life joined up, lawyers, loggers, lumbermen, mechanics and merchants, all trying to do their part to provide their community with military protection.

Last Wednesday Briscoe, who has been appointed commander of the company in its formative stage, with six other men repaid the call by appearing here at the regular drill of Company C at the armory Wednesday evening. The first drill in Lakeview was held last Thursday at which time 19 more men enlisted.

February 8 to June 15 — Stamp No. 17, war ration book No. 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
February 20—Retail sales of canned fruits and vegetables ends at midnight.

COFFEE
March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 15 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
March 1—All "C" coupon books and most "B" cards must be renewed.

TIRES
February 28—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to this date.

FUEL OIL
February 12-13 — Dealer registration.
