

38 MEN FOLD BANDAGES AT MONDAY MEET

Thirty-eight men turned out Monday night for the Red Cross surgical dressing project and in an evening of intensive work turned out 639 inspected and approved surgical dressings for use in caring for the wounded overseas. Considering it was the first night for all workers, the production was regarded as high.

The effort was termed a success in every way, and another "men's night" will be observed next Monday night. Any man in the city willing to help out on this vital war project is welcome to participate at Red Cross headquarters, on Main near Fourth, next Monday, it was pointed out.

Mrs. R. H. Macartney, in charge of the Red Cross surgical dressing project, declared that the men's project is the "most encouraging development we have had in months." She said that the men's participation had awakened new interest among women of the city, and that this was shown in Monday's daytime work, when women turned out far more than the usual number of dressings.

Mrs. Macartney and the corps of women instructors present Monday said the men showed quick adaptability and did a most efficient job.
