

CAPITAL EYES REGISTRATION OF STOCK MEN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—A suggestion for government purchase of live animals and for registration of every person who sells controlled meats as a means to combat the black market in meat and keep small packers in business appeared to be gaining support today in the house small business committee.

David Ginsburg, general counsel for the office of price administration, described the plan as "worth considering" after Chairman Patman (D-Tex.) asked whether it would not prove feasible to accomplish the double objective.

Bust-up Predicted
The proposal was advanced yesterday by Wilbur La Rue, Jr., counsel for the National Independent Meat Packers association, who said the industry was suffering from government action in fixing ceilings on meat products but not on the live animals.

A senate committee was told meanwhile that an OPA order freezing milk prices to farmers was "the beginning of the bust up and breakdown of OPA" and would make inevitable the rationing of milk. The testimony came from Charles B. Holman, representing the Milk Producers Federation.

Do It Quickly
Discussing the meat situation further before the house group, Ginsburg contended that ceiling prices were sufficiently high at the present time to allow a "fair profit to the major output" of the packing industry.

"If," he added, "you seek to raise prices where it will cover the costs of the least efficient producers, then you have raised them beyond the point of stability."

"Of course, you've got to raise some prices," injected Patman. "Something has got to be done, and done quickly."

Patman added that the army, navy and maritime commission recognized that small companies must be given prices high enough to keep them in business, and declared "I can't understand why this policy isn't recognized by OPA."

La Rue yesterday declared that the meat price regulations and quota regulations "have resulted in the worst black market in the history of our country."

COURT REVERSAL SIGNIFICANT HERE

Supreme court reversal of a local verdict against the Arcade hotel, which had been sued because a guest hurt his hand when a porcelain faucet handle broke, is legally significant because several similar cases are pending, according to William Kuykendall, attorney. Kuykendall represented the Arcade hotel in its successful appeal for a reversal of a verdict of \$1028 given Jack Doherty.

Kuykendall said several cases having to do with porcelain faucet handles are pending in various courts. The supreme court ruled that there was no showing that common experience had proved porcelain faucet handles as dangerous.

Welded Tanker Set for Tough Test at Dock

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 17 (AP)—The Quebec, second welded tanker launched by the Henry Kaiser Swan Island shipyard, was scheduled for its toughest test today at the company's outfitting dock. The vessel completed its trial run last night and today central tanks were to be emptied and fore and aft tanks loaded with ballast in what A. R. Nieman, yards manager, said was tantamount to an effort to break the ship in two.

The first tanker from the yards, the Schenectady, did break in two, cracking apart amidships and sinking while tied up at the outfitting dock.

Services Held For Civil War Veteran, 97

PORTLAND, Feb. 17 (AP)—Funeral services for Francis M. Lawhead, 97, of Portland, one of the state's few remaining Civil War veterans, will be held here tomorrow. He died Monday.

He joined the 53d Ohio Volunteers and fought through the entire war between the states. He met President Lincoln upon several occasions.

Four sons and four daughters survive.

TRUCKERS URGED TO BEAT DEADLINE

To avoid waiting and confusion, the Office of Defense Transportation today urged operators of all commercial vehicles, including farmers, not to wait for the deadline for tire inspections—February 28.

Reports indicate, ODT said, that inspection of farm truck tires has been particularly slow. The record of tire inspections, ODT said, should be entered on the back of the certificate of war necessity, since those certificates which do not have this valid endorsement cannot be used to obtain gasoline ration coupons or tire certificates from local War Price and Ration boards.

It was pointed out, however, that non-licensed off the highway equipment including trucks used exclusively on the farms are not included in this ruling and the tires of these vehicles do not have to be inspected.

Rationing Calendar

SHOES

February 9 to June 15 — Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2

February 20—Retail sales of canned fruits and vegetables ends at midnight.

February 22 to 27—Registration for war ration book No. 2 at schools.

March 1—Rationing of canned and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables begins.

SUGAR

March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires.

COFFEE

March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 15 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE

March 1—All "C" coupon books and most "B" cards must be renewed.

March 21—No. 4 stamps each good for four gallons expire at midnight.

TIRES

February 28—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to this date.

March 31—Cars with A books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle D books.

FUEL OIL

February 17—Last day for consumer registration.
