YANK LOSSES QUITE HEAVY, SAYS STIMSON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today that American forces in central Tunisia had suffered a "serious local setback" which "should not be minimized, but still less should it be exaggerated."

Reports are incomplete, the secretary told his press conference, but the American forces apparently have suffered rather

heavy casualties in both personnel and equipment, with a number of tanks destroyed by German dive bombers in the fighting of the last four days.

against the relatively lightly-held American lines in central Tunisia came while the British 8th army in Tripolitania was occupied in reorganization and the British first army in northern Tunisia was "mud-bound," but apparently was intended only to widen the corridor along the coast between German forces in northern and southern Tunisia and was not the beginning of any large scale offensive by the axis forces.
