

OPA ACTION ON MILK, POULTRY IS PROTESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18 (P)—The office of price administration served up welcome food-cost news for housewives of the Pacific coast Monday.

Briefly it was this: Consumers in five western states will have to pay no more for their milk, at least until the next order comes along, than the top price for January, 1943.

Effective today, broilers and fryers will be governed by a revised maximum regulation which the OPA said would result in a sharp reduction of prices for the two poultry items. Spokesmen for both the milk and poultry industries voiced opposition to the OPA's actions, declaring in each case the orders would cause a marked decline in production.

Regional OPA officials said prospective increases in milk prices had been forestalled by the decision to freeze producers' prices at the highest levels for January.

The OPA last week reduced the price of alfalfa hay—a big production item—in California, Washington and Oregon in a move preliminary to the freeze order. Milk men quickly organized protests to Washington. Even with a cut in the alfalfa expense, they said they could not be expected to operate long at a profit under the new ceiling.

Besides the three coastal states, Arizona and Nevada also are included in the freeze order. The OPA acted to lower the poultry prices by announcing it would not renew temporary adjustments permitting wholesalers to market at their highest individual charges from Sept. 28 through Oct. 2 last. Maximum prices now are fixed at 32½ cents a pound for dressed broilers and 34 cents for fryers.

Officials noted that a maximum of 28½ and 30 cents had been allowed for live broilers and fryers, respectively, but added, "it is expected that live birds intended to be dressed will be sold considerably below the live ceiling." Cost of dressing, they said, is considerably more than the four cents permitted as the margin between live and dressed birds.

3. Number of cans, bottles, and jars (8-ounce size or larger) of commercially packed fruits, vegetables, juices and soups, chili sauce and catsup owned on February 21, 1943, minus 5 for each person included in this Declaration.

JAPANESE FARMING MACHINERY SOUGHT

The amount of farm machinery and automotive equipment owned by Japanese and held in storage or otherwise not in productive use, is surprisingly small, according to word received here by the office of war information.

A survey has been carried on by the war relocation authority by contacting county war boards, agricultural extension agents, agricultural commission, implement dealers, financial institutions and other agencies and persons who might furnish factual information. At the same time interviews with heads of families at the relocation centers have been conducted to obtain information.

The survey in Washington and Oregon has so far revealed 43 tractors, 35 assorted plows, 35 discs and harrows, 24 trucks and a miscellaneous collection of planters and cultivators. As fast as idle equipment is being revealed, everything possible is being done to accelerate its transfer, the OWI stated, and that the evacuee owners are responding to offers to sell any idle equipment when fair prices are obtainable.

OPA OFFICIALS ASK CONSUMERS TO USE BLANK

OPA officials appealed today to the public to use newspaper reproductions of the consumer declaration form needed during registration for war ration book two during the week of February 22.

A shortage of supplies of the form makes it imperative that everyone clip the consumer declaration reproduction from newspapers, it was explained.

One Is Enough
The consumer declaration sheet must be filed at the time a person applies for war ration book two. In order to save time of both the registrars and the public, the declaration should be filled out but not signed before going to the school registration site.

One declaration form is sufficient for an entire family if it contains the names of all the persons for whom the declaration is made. The sheet simply declares the excess amounts of rationed canned goods on hand on February 21, the first day after retail sales of such foods are suspended until March 1—and the excess amount of coffee held by the applicant as of November 28, 1942, the day when coffee rationing began.

Give Total Number
Here is what to declare: Canned goods—All cans, bottles, and jars weighing eight ounces or more of canned fruits, vegetables, fruit and vegetable juices, all canned soups, chili sauce and catsup, in excess of five containers for each person in the family.

For example, a family of four is allowed 20 cans weighing eight ounces or more of all these goods, and all over that amount should be listed. It is not necessary to state how many cans of peas, beans, or peaches are included in the excess. The only figure required is the total number of cans, bottles or jars exceeding the allowable amount of goods. Do not include canned olives, canned meat and fish, pickles, relish, jellies, jams, preserves, spaghetti, macaroni, and noodles or home canned foods.

Coffee—The net figure on coffee to be declared is the number of pounds on hand on November 28 in excess of one pound for each person whose age is stated as 14 years or older on war ration book one.

Weekly Market Trends

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the government leased wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State college. The material, in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market, is not intended to replace spot day by day market reports.)

CATTLE MARKETS

Livestock markets generally were more abundant at North Portland Monday, including 1550 head of cattle, of which 1200 were offered for local sale. Demand was active, however, and prices remained strong, with medium to good fed steers ranging from \$14 to \$15.40. Heifers topped at \$14.50. Steers were scarce at San Francisco, with no definite prices established, while at Chicago prices were up as much as 25 cents, with a top of \$16.85 paid for some short fed steers averaging 1350 pounds.

Beef steers are being marketed in greater numbers in the mid-west than for the past several months, and are showing better than average quality and weight. Buying preference in recent weeks has been for the medium grades, while prices on the better grades have tended slightly lower than formerly. At North Portland drastic reductions in cattle receipts have continued since the first of the year, which has shortened reserve holdings and helped create an active demand. Values have moved upward week by week despite statements by killers that costs of the live animals were already too high. Even so, stocker and feeder buyers are having considerable trouble getting supplies as killers are willing to take nearly everything in sight.

SHEEP AND LAMB MARKETS

The sheep and lamb supply also was up at North Portland, with 1750 head offered locally. Though trading was rather slow, prices were maintained, with good to choice fed woolled lambs weighing 95 to 100 pounds bringing \$15 to \$15.15. At San Francisco three decks of good woolled lambs brought \$15.75, while at Chicago a top of \$16.35 was paid for fed woolled western lambs.

Contracting of spring lambs for delivery in late March through early June is now under way in southern California, where it is estimated around 200,000 are already under contract. Most of the contracts in the San Joaquin valley have ranged from \$13 to \$13.25 per hundred. Some offers of \$14.50 and better have been reported by local packers for top bands of fat lambs during March. Forage conditions in the early lamb producing areas of California have improved greatly since January.

HOG MARKETS

Hog receipts were not quite as high as normally on Monday, as only 1350 head were available

for local trading. Prices ranged to 25 cents higher than Friday's close and 30 cents higher than a week previous. Carload lots of best offerings brought mostly \$16, with a few up to \$16.15. The San Francisco hog market showed a slight decline, however, with an extreme top of \$16 paid for Oregon barrows and gilts averaging 280 pounds. Prices gained slightly in Chicago, with a top of \$15.75.

WOOL MARKETS

Though not much activity was reported in the Boston wool market, some contracting of wool for spring delivery was reported from Wyoming, Idaho, Montana and Texas. Texas prices figured a little under the ceiling delivered at Boston. Sale of graded fine medium territory wools from Wyoming and Montana was made at \$1.18, clean basis. The contracting in Wyoming was reported at a grease price of 40 cents for fine wool, Idaho original bag wool running mostly to three-eighths and quarter-blood was contracted at a grease price of 41 cents.

The USDA has reported an adequate supply of burlap and paper bags available for handling the 1943 wool clip. Early ordering is recommended.

England's Trade, Foreign Policy Bears On Rubber

SEATTLE, Feb. 18 (P)—The question of England's trade in rubber and that of post-war foreign policy will be important factors in determining whether synthetic rubber will replace the natural product in United States factories, Harvey S. Firestone, Jr., president of the rubber company which bears his family name, said here yesterday.

The basis of synthetic rubber is petroleum and making it in great quantities would be an additional drain on oil fields, he said. He expressed the opinion that the nation's stockpile of rubber plus synthetic production would carry through 1943 with a slim reserve. The real rubber test, he declared, will come in 1944.

'V' GARDENING CONFAB SLATED FEBRUARY 23

Signaling the opening of what promises to be the biggest gardening year in local history, a Klamath county "victory garden conference" will be held at 1:30 p. m. February 23 at the chamber of commerce quarters.

J. R. McCambridge, assistant county agent, has sent out letters to garden and civic groups, asking that they send representatives to the conference.

"The need for growing a garden this year is of much greater importance than last," said McCambridge.

"The supply of fresh vegetables which has heretofore been shipped into Klamath Falls no doubt will be a thing of the past until the war is over. A large percentage of the commercial canned vegetables and fruits will be going lend-lease and to the armed forces, and rationing will also cut the civilian supply. Shortages of tin, steel, transportation facilities and manpower will make this situation very acute unless each family which can do so raises a garden."

Thomas Onsdorff or E. H. Wiegand, food industries specialists of Oregon State college, will be here to discuss the food situation as it pertains to commercially canned vegetables and fruits, and the necessity of home production and preservation.

CONTRACT AWARDED

Potatoes Are Rich in Vital Food Values

Potatoes are the outstanding breakfast, dinner, supper vegetable. There are more food values under their brown jackets than we usually credit them with. Potatoes contain vitamin C, vitamin B1 (thiamin), iron, protein and starch. Sweet potatoes score on two more counts. They are a good source of carotene which the body can change into vitamin A. They also have some sugar, points out Winnifred K. Gillen.

To get the most from potatoes, cook them in their jackets. When potatoes are peeled, keep the peelings thin because prized minerals lie close beneath the surface. Peel potatoes just before you cook them. Don't let them soak for minerals and vitamins are lost. Cook them in a small amount of water.
