

FARMER SLAIN IN QUARREL NEAR TOLEDO

TOLEDO, Ore., Feb. 19 (AP)—An altercation between two Cougar mountain farmers who were living together, ended last night in the death of one and the surrender to Sheriff George Robinson of Lincoln county of the other.

Eliga W. Woody, about 65, told Robinson he fatally shot Charles Phillips, 67, with an 1897 model shotgun and that he acted in self-defense.

The sheriff summoned Dr. Joseph W. Beeman, state police criminologist, to make a complete investigation. Woody is in the Lincoln county jail here. Officers were bringing Phillips' body out this morning.

Record
Woody walked to the Cougar mountain forest lookout station after the shooting and reported it to Lookout Irvin Hussey who notified state police at Newport. Sgt. William J. Mulkey, Sheriff Robinson, District Attorney L. G. English and other officers trekked into the area, apprehended Woody, who was waiting for them, and found Phillips' body about 200 yards from a cabin in which they found evidence of a struggle.

Robinson said Phillips had recently been released from the state penitentiary to which he was sentenced for four years in 1939 for carrying concealed weapons. The sheriff said as near as he knew, both men were single.

Don Gray Feeds the Gun In Guadalcanal Battle

Before the United States marines turned over Guadalcanal to the U. S. army, a thrilling story was written in a foxhole by Sgt. B. M. Price of Atlanta, Ga., marine combat correspondent, and mentioning the name of PFC Don Gray of Fort Klamath, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Gray of the state fish hatchery at Crooked creek.

The story opened at dawn one morning, took the men through heavy fighting in muddy foxholes and damp jungles, constantly under machine gun and mortar fire. The following paragraphs are of interest:

"Sgt. James B. Brumbaugh, Toledo, Ore., who has brothers in the army and navy, is putting on a great exhibition of coolness under fire. He keeps popping up in full view of the Japs and spraying the enemy with fire from his automatic rifle. He ducks only to reload.

"While Brumbaugh keeps the Japs' attention focused in his direction, Corp. S. Baune of Detroit, inches his 30 calibre machine gun into the enemy's face and sprays the area. Feeding the gun and carrying ammunition are two privates first class, Harry Lindlan, Jr., of Mound City, Minn., and Don Gray, of Fort Klamath, Ore."

Young Gray, pictured, enlisted while a student at Chilquinn high school, along with Sam Emerson, son of Mrs. Willard Beckman, Crater Lake park employee. Two other Fort Klamath boys, also members of the marines, are Vernon Wimer, son of Archie Wimer, formerly of Fort Klamath and Mrs. Golda Smith of Tulelake, and PFC Weston Engle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Engle. Mrs. Engle is the Fort Klamath telephone operator. All four have been together since

the marines landed in the Solomons.

The Gray family is particularly happy at this time as letters returned to them led the parents to believe their son had been killed in action. Checking through the war department they find that Donald is still fighting although probably now having a well deserved rest following the Guadalcanal campaign.

RIDE-SHARING PLANS PUSHED

Plans for promoting further "ride-sharing" and "car-rotating" arrangements are being pushed by the OPA office in cooperation with an executive transportation committee of the major war plants in the Portland-Vancouver area, the district OPA announced today.

Increasing demands upon mass transportation facilities and possible further restrictions due to limitations on parts, rubber and manpower makes it necessary that all available passenger cars be used to the utmost, the OPA pointed out.

38,000 workers in the Portland-Vancouver area will be applying through their transportation committees for renewal of B and C mileage rations before the end of the month, OPA officials stated. They will be required to indicate on their applications how many passengers they are carrying, and if they don't have a full load, why not, and also what other means of transportation are available. These questions must be answered to the satisfaction of the transportation committees and the ration boards before the renewals will be granted, said the OPA.

JIM RAWLINS DIES IN GAS CHAMBER TODAY

FLORENCE, Ariz., Feb. 19 (AP)—Big Jim Rawlins, 46, died in Arizona's lethal gas chamber today as the state exacted its toll for the rape and murder of touseled-headed little Marilyn Erma Atkins.

Rawlins left death row at six a. m., and had been strapped in a chair in the tiny white death room by 6:05. Eight and one-half minutes later Warden A. G. Walker told the witnesses

crowded near the glass partition that Rawlins was dead. The former machinist who ravished and then strangled to death the 11-year-old girl in Morenci, August 29, 1942, spent his last hour with two Presbyterian ministers, Rev. Elbert Nash of Morenci and Rev. S. B. Hanah, the prison chaplain.

"Silence is golden," was all Rawlins would say before he left the cell he has occupied since September 15.
