

Rector Describes Life Under Hitler

Rev. Wissenbach Tells of Three Years in Germany In Charge of Church at Munich

Life and conditions under the Hitler regime were described to the Soroptimist club by the Reverend Frederick C. Wissenbach, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, who was the guest speaker at Thursday's luncheon held in the Pelican party room.

Mrs. Rose Poole, president of the club, turned the meeting over to Mrs. Ida Odell, the program chairman, who introduced Reverend Wissenbach to the club.

Reverend Wissenbach left Germany in 1912, to come to the United States, remaining in this country until his return to Germany in 1932, to take charge of the American Episcopal church in Munich.

Many interesting experiences were recounted to the club, one of which concerned the time he saw men in brown uniforms with the swastika arm band and a tin box in their hand standing on street corners, collecting money. He inquired of his mother what this was for and she informed him that the money was "for that man Hitler who attempted the putsch, but he's on his way out now."

Reverend Wissenbach felt that the German people didn't know nearly as much about what was going on in Germany as the outside world did. He was also in Munich at the time Mussolini marched into Ethiopia, much to the surprise of all foreign embassies.

The Wissenbachs had intended to remain ten years in Germany but at the end of three years, in 1935, they found it expedient to leave. Rev. Wissenbach said he found his telephone line had been tapped for sometime and his viewpoint not coinciding with the reigning powers made it necessary for them to leave. He bought their tickets in one direction but thought it essential to take himself and his family in another direction and they heaved a sigh of thankfulness when they crossed the Belgian border.
