Rationing Calendar

SHOES
February 9 to June 15 — Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
February 20—Retail sales of canned fruits and vegetables ended at midnight Saturday.

February 22 to 27—Registration for war ration book No. 2 at schools.

March 1—Rationing of canned and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables begins.

SUGAR
March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires.

COFFEE
March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1, of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
March 1—All "C" coupon books and most "B" cards must be renewed.

March 21—No. 4 stamps each good for four gallons expire at midnight.

TIRES
February 28—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to this date.

March 31—Cars with A books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle D books.

COMMERCIAL REGISTRATION
March 1 to 10—Restaurants and boarding houses must sign up for point stamps.

Ration To Be Adjusted For Those in Remote Districts

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Sheepherders in the wide open spaces of the west may not have to live "on an old ewe and sheepherders' biscuits straight," as one Montana wool grower feared.

The food administration plans to permit persons to purchase rationed foods to supply them for a longer time than the regular rationing period.

Harold B. Rowe, director of the food rationing division, so advised Senator Wheeler (D-Mont) after the senator had expressed concern for ranchers whose employes sometimes see civilization only once or twice a year.

Replying to the senator's inquiry regarding the canned goods supply for sheepherders who spend several months 50 to 100 miles from town, Rowe said adjustments will be made in the rationed quantities for persons who would suffer undue hardships by not getting additional amounts.

The senator quoted Harry A. Snyder, sheepman of Billings, Mont., in saying the ration of 35 pounds of canned goods per person per year would mean less than one case of milk or a case of corn, where the ration for a sheepherder, isolated for eight or nine months at a time, should be close to three cases a month.

CRACKDOWN SET ON TIRE INSPECTORS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22 (AP)—At least 10 per cent of the tires condemned on the Pacific coast could have been left in service with only minor repairs, an OPA official said recently.

The statement was made by John M. Olney, OPA mileage rationing representative, in pledging speedy action to weed out careless tire inspectors who, he asserted, are attempting to "feather their own nests" at the expense of the public.

It followed a meeting attended by district tire examiners from California and Nevada for instruction in proper procedure of checking tires.

A similar gathering has been called in Portland March 2 for examiners from Seattle, Spokane, Klamath Falls and Portland.
