## WALLACE MUST DIE FRIDAY FOR CRIME

SALEM, Feb. 22 (P)—William E. Wallace, 38, Portland, sentenced to die at 8:30 a. m. next Friday in the state prison's lethal gas chamber, is in good spirits and is reconciled to his fate, State Prison Warden George Alexander said today.

Wallace's only hope is for Governor Earl Snell to commute his sentence. Ex-Governor Charles A. Sprague denied clemency, and the supreme court upheld the conviction.

Wallace was convicted of the first degree murder of Benjamin Finkell, Portland. Wallace shot Finkell on a downtown Portland street.

The execution of Harvey Cunningham, Portland negro, also had been scheduled for next Friday, but the execution was delayed when Cunningham appealed last week.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (P)— The softwood plywood industry advisory committee told the war production board today the supply of that material has become "critically limited."

The committee, reporting that decreasing production would not meet increasing demands, suggested further simplification of production methods and substitution of other woods for Douglas fir.

SALEM, Feb. 22 (P)— The Salem city jail still was intact today, despite repeated efforts of an inmate to burn it down.

Gordon S. Little, who has served sentences in Oregon and Arizona penitentiaries, was arrested by city police on a check forgery charge. Shortly after his arrest, he began building fires in his cell in an effort to destroy the jail and win his freedom.

## MP Protection From Camp White Refused To Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 22 (P)— Military police protection from Camp White for Grants Pass and vicinity on weekends has been refused Police Chief Carl Dallas for the second time by Camp White officials.

Major Luke Kirillin informed Dallas Friday that the camp does not have enough military police to send to Grants Pass and also that the distance is too great. Kirillin suggested that military personnel violating city ordinances or state laws be treated the same as any private citizen and that any arrest should be reported to the offender's commanding officer.

Dallas asked that MP's be sent here following a weekend marked by several brawls.

## SIMPLER FUEL OIL RATIONING BACKED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (P)— A senate investigating committee reported today, among other things, that an increase in military demands for the Pacific might cause a shortage of fuel oil in Oregon and Washington next winter.

The committee recommended simpler fuel oil rationing methods and centralization of controls in the petroleum administrator for war to eliminate the "present intolerable division of authority."

The special committee headed by Senator Maloney (D-Conn.) told the senate that little improvement in supply conditions can be expected "during this and following wartime winters." It recommended that a straight percentage cut in fuel oil allotments, based on use during the 1941-42 winter, replace the present complicated system of determining the number of coupons to be issued to householders.

## Employees to Pay Tribute to Dead in Frye Crash-Fire

SEATTLE, Feb. 22 (P)—Work will stop for one minute tomorrow at the Boeing Aircraft plant while employees stand in silent tribute to the 11 airmen, aeronautical engineering employees of Boeing's, who were killed last Thursday when their plane crashed into the Frye Packing company building here.

During that interval loud speakers will carry the prayer of benediction and the notes of a bugler sounding taps from joint funeral services for the crew at the Masonic temple.

Three more bodies were recovered at the Frye plant yesterday, raising the death toll of 31. Bodies were identified as those of A. J. Fowler, Sam Ovensoff and Joe Hoy, all of Seattle.

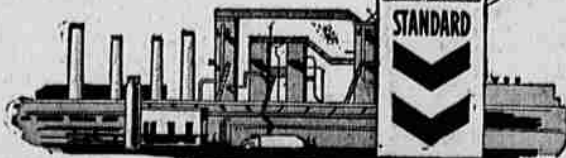
