Stanley Woodruff was reelected to the post of principal of Klamath Union high school, and seven of the eight elementary school principals were reappointed at a meeting of the school boards Monday night.

Mrs. Myrtle Helm, principal of Joseph Conger school and a member of the city schools' faculty for the past 21 years, has reached the age of retirement and completes her work this year. Superintendent Arnold Gralapp and members of the board paid tribute to Mrs. Helm's long and faithful years of service in the school system.

Arnold Gralapp said these principals reelected to administrative positions, are subject to assignment later in the school year.

Committees from the elementary and high school teaching staffs attended the board meeting and presented data on salary schedules and food and clothing costs. The high school presentation was made by Walter Eschebeck and Paul Angstead headed the elementary group.

The board will study the material presented by the joint group.

CAPT. HUNTER DIES IN S. F. HOSPITAL

Capt. Harry H. Hunter, 48, for three weeks commanding officer at Newell, died at 10:30 a. m. Monday in Letterman hospital, San Francisco, following a six weeks' illness, according to word received here.

Captain Hunter had served in the U. S. army for a number of years. He replaced Capt. Frank Patterson at Newell. Capt. Hunter suffered an attack of pneumonia, was moved to Klamath Valley hospital here January 7, and later to Letterman the morning of January 23. His condition had been considered critical for some time.

Capt. C. W. Maples, formerly stationed at Camp Hooper, Ogden, Utah, is now serving as Newell's commanding officer.

Rationing Calendar

SHOES
February 9 to June 15 — Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
February 20—Retail sales of canned fruits and vegetables ended at midnight Saturday.

February 22 to 27—Registration for war ration book No. 2 at schools.

March 1—Rationing of canned and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables begins.

SUGAR
March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires.

COFFEE
March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
March 1—All "C" coupon books and most "B" cards must be renewed.
March 21—No. 4 stamps each good for four gallons expire at midnight.

TIRES
February 28—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to this date.

March 31—Cars with A books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle D books.

COMMERCIAL REGISTRATION
March 1 to 10—Restaurants and boarding houses must sign up for point stamps.

PEACE MOVE BY FINNS FAVORED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Sumner Welles, undersecretary of state, reiterated today the hope of the American government that Finland soon would withdraw from the war against Russia.

Asked at his press conference whether he thought the time was approaching for Finland to disassociate itself from Germany's war against Russia, Welles replied that the position of the United States had been made very clear in the past months.

Because of the real friendship and large measure of understanding between the people of Finland and the people of the United States, he said it was only natural that this country should hope that the government of Finland would no longer give effective military aid to the mortal enemies of the United States and other United Nations, and to the mortal enemies of exactly that kind of democracy and human liberty that the people of Finland themselves have believed in and stood for.

U. S. CLIPPER CRASHES; 24 DEAD, MISSING

LISBON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Salvage crews worked at the bottom of the Tagus river today, attempting to lift the shattered hulk of the Yankee Clipper which crashed yesterday at the end of a flight from New York.

Twenty of the 39 persons announced by the U. S. legation to have been aboard the great flying boat when it caught fire and smashed into the water remained sealed in its cabin or had been swept away by the swift current of the Tagus.

Injured in Hospital
Three bodies were recovered yesterday and one person died last night in a hospital here, bringing the total of dead and missing to 24.

Of the 15 survivors, all but two were still in hospital, but their injuries were not serious. One of them was Jane Froman of New York, radio singer.

Names Held
All four women passengers aboard were saved. One, listed as Yvet Silver, escaped unhurt. The American legation refused to reveal either the names of the dead and missing or those of all the survivors, saying the information would have to come from the state department at Washington.

PLAY SHOE RATION TO BE SUSPENDED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—The temporary exemption from rationing of "play shoes" and some other types of shoes not ordinarily worn on the street will become effective Thursday.

OPA announced this Monday, along with a re-definition of infant's shoes, to place in the non-rationed classification all baby shoes up to size four. Originally, only soft-soled infant shoes were on the ration-free list. Sizes above four will be subject to rationing regardless of the type of sole.

The order excluded from rationing current stocks of ski shoes, skate shoes, rubber-soled shoes with fabric uppers, locker sandals, bathing slippers, and other play shoes with uppers made of fabric or types of leather not on the critical list.

The exemption is limited to stocks of shoes now in the hands of retailers, wholesalers, or manufacturers or which are manufactured before April 16. Any shoes made after that date will be on the rationed list.

WHEAT QUOTAS SUSPENDED TO INSURE SUPPLY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Wickard suspended AAA marketing quotas on wheat today in a move he said was designed to insure adequate wartime supplies of the cereal for human food and livestock feed.

The order affected quotas imposed on the 1942 crops and those established for the 1943 crop.

No Penalty
Under marketing quotas, farmers were free to sell, use or feed only that wheat grown on their AAA planting allotments. Wheat from the 1942 crop sold, used or fed from excess acreages was subject to a penalty tax of 54 cents a bushel. The penalty would have been around 60 cents on the 1943 crop.

Wickard also made a change in the 1943 farm program to allow farmers to increase their plantings of wheat without being penalized under the benefit payment and crop loans program.

Wheat Released
Under this change, farmers who plant at least 90 per cent of their AAA goals for so-called war crops—such as soybeans, flax, dry beans and peas, potatoes and grain sorghums—may overplant their 1943 wheat allotments and still be eligible for benefit payments and wheat loans.

Previously farmers who overplanted were not eligible for wheat loans and maximum benefit payments.

Today's action on marketing quotas releases for sale or use without penalty excess wheat from the 1942 crop which farmers may now be holding in storage.
