Eastern Pulp Wood Suppliers to Charge West Maximum Price

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—The office of price administration said yesterday eastern suppliers of wood pulp allocated to west coast paper mills will be permitted to charge the maximum prices established for eastern deliveries instead of lower western prices.

The OPA said the change, effective February 27, was made to enable the west coast mills to obtain wood pulp which is not available in the west.

Wood pulp produced in the western area will continue at prices \$6 a short air dry ton less than the maximum prices for deliveries to mills east of the Continental divide, exclusive of Denver.

No Horsemeat Hamburgers for Idaho, Says Expert

BOISE, Ida., Feb. 23 (AP)—There'll be no horsemeat hamburgers for Idaho.

That is the opinion of Dr. J. S. Sorenson, chief of the state bureau of animal husbandry, who reported "there is more meat on the hoof in Idaho now than ever before."

In addition, he said, there are no federally inspected horsemeat packing plants in the area, and state laws do not permit the use of horsemeat in sausage.

MEETING HELD IN LANGELL VALLEY

LANGELL VALLEY — The regular meeting of the Langell Valley soil conservation district board of supervisors was held on February 6, at the Langell valley irrigation district office. R. R. Davis was sworn in as the new supervisor of the district, to serve for three years.

The board of supervisors decided to request the soil conservation service to exchange the 50 diesel tractor for an R. D-8 with a 12-yard carryall scraper. The board made this decision because they believe they can accomplish more land leveling and conservation work on more farms.

The district will also have a Marvin land plane or a large Eversman leveler to assist farmers who have conservation plans with the district. With this equipment available on a rental basis, the district supervisors hope to assist a larger number of small farmers accomplish their objectives in war crops. At the next regular meeting to be held at 8 p. m., March 13, the supervisors hope to have a number of cooperating farmers help them decide on how to route the equipment available to give as many farmers as possible an opportunity to increase their war crops this coming year.
