Table with columns for WEIGHT, POINT VALUES, and various food categories including Fruits and Fruit Juices, Vegetables and Vegetable Juices, and Other Processed Foods. Includes sub-sections for Canned and Bottled, Frozen, and Dried and Dehydrated.

This table with its 16 columns for various sizes of canned, bottled, dried, dehydrated and frozen foods shows at a glance how many points any chosen item will cost. Each member of your family is allowed 48 points worth of food for the month of March. Column on left shows variety of foods. The purchaser can follow down the list, pick his item, then follow across to the size of the can he wishes. Size is denoted on top of vertical columns. The column having the correct size at the top will show number of points in blackface type. Briefly: find the item, read across for size. Intersecting square contains number of points. The 17th column denotes the rate of points per pound each item costs. It is used only when item weighs more than four pounds.

John Chennault Awarded DFC for Aleutians Action

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Feb. 24 (AP)—The Alaska defense command announced today that Lieut. Col. John B. Chennault, son of Brig. Gen. Claire L. Chennault, chief of the United States air task force in China, had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for outstanding courage in attacking a Japanese encampment at Kiska and strafing a Japanese submarine, leaving it settling by the stern.
