NO cattle hide for white, turtan or blue-jacket shoes.

NO straps over a tongue or vamp (as in monk strap shoes).

NO leather outsoles for saddle-type, moccasin-type or mid-guard vamp shoes in low heels.

NO multiple straps on Roman sandals.

NO platforms of any kind on high-heeled shoes.

NO leather covered platforms on any shoes.

NO cattle hide upper leather 4 1/2 ounces or over (which cuts out some very popular rugged types).

YANK LOSSES IN TUNISIA SCALED DOWN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—The sharp fighting in central Tunisia has resulted in a clean-cut repulse of Marshal Erwin Rommel's armored Nazi forces, Secretary of War Stimson reported today, but "we will not have an easy nor a quick victory."

Losses by the American forces, he told his press conference, have been less heavy than was first believed to be the case. Material losses, including tanks, scout cars and field guns have been heavy, he added, but much of this equipment already has been replaced.

The constant air support given the ground forces was vital to the successful counter attack against the axis, the secretary commented, but the "most significant reaction" was that of the ground troops.

The early estimates of losses in men have been reduced somewhat, Stimson said, as a number of units made their way back to American positions through axis lines.

They were not broken by the German advance, but came back with a vigor the Germans were unable to withstand, he said.

"General Eisenhower reports that all complacency has been dropped. They are thoroughly mad and ready to fight."

The greater part of the British first army is still immobilized by mud in northern Tunisia, Stimson said, but units from this force gave important assistance to the American troops in hurling back the northerly of two German columns which had advanced past the Kasserine pass after the initial breakthroughs west of Faid and Sene.

DEFERMENTS TO BE INVESTIGATED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Uncle Sam's estimated 3,000,000 civilian employees blinked today in the spotlight of investigations projected by five house committees, one of which branched out to take in all draft deferments granted by local boards.

The Dies committee, the appropriations, civil service, naval affairs, and the military affairs committees mapped plans to find out what government workers are doing, with a special view to determining the need for their services, their loyalty to the government and the reasons an estimated 1,000,000 of them aren't in army or navy uniforms.

In an address broadcast last night, Chairman Dies (D-Tex.) of the committee investigating un-American activities pledged his group to tackle with renewed vigor its assignment to rid the government payroll of all persons harboring subversive sentiments.

Naval Vessel Measure Gets Swift Approval

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—A measure authorizing construction, acquisition or conversion of a million tons of auxiliary naval vessels was approved swiftly today by the house naval committee.

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) estimated the cost at approximately \$1,000,000,000.

There was no indication as to just what type of vessels are involved, but it was presumed that some of the tonnage would be used for combating the submarine menace and a good part of it built into supply ships accomplishing the navy's men-o-war.

Churchill Spends Restful Night

LONDON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill, who has been ill with pneumonia, spent a restful night and his condition continued to show general improvement, it was announced today.

Friends reported the prime minister was sufficiently well yesterday to sit up in bed and smoke one of his favorite cigars.

A bulletin from Ten Downing street tonight said "the prime minister's condition continues to improve."

Striking Smelter Plant Workers Ignore WLB Order

CLEVELAND, Feb. 25 (AP)—Aluminum Company of America announced today 15 striking smelter plant workers who failed to return to their jobs under a war labor board order no longer were considered employees of the company.

An ALCOA spokesman said this position was based upon the WLB order for 150 strikers to resume work or be discharged automatically.

Forty-eight of 63 men regularly employed on the 7 a. m. shift reported at the smelter plant but this group failed to work, the spokesman added. Fred H. Bullen, director of disputes for the WLB, said he told the men the order explicitly demanded they resume operations.

As the board considered this new development, ALCOA's in-plant production remained at a standstill. The board's ultimatum, issued last night, followed the strikers' failure to comply with a previous order threatening "prompt and vigorous disciplinary action" unless work was resumed.

The work stoppage began Monday after five furnace tenders were discharged on orders from the army air force.

George Wilkey, civilian investigator, said the order came from Col. George E. Strong of Detroit, chief of the internal security division of the air force's central procurement district, after an investigation of recurrent slowdowns at ALCOA. Wilkey reported the men were released because they were "not sufficiently qualified, careful, efficient, or reliable to retain jobs in war production."

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Knowledge of Food Values Essential Now

How can the homemaker best meet the unsettled food situation in her daily routine of trying to feed her family adequate meals for good nutrition? Doubtless that question is facing nearly every busy housewife who has heard so much about meal planning and better nutrition in war time, says Winnifred K. Gillen, chairman of the Klamath county nutrition committee for defense.

Quick adjustments are often necessary when going to market and finding the meat case empty or no milk in the refrigerator. One of the most important aids in this situation, says Mrs. Gillen, is knowing food values and being able to substitute "something else" of similar nutritive value.

Canned Milk Useful

The country is well supplied with beans, which are a fair substitute for meat, says Mrs. Gillen. Families fortunate enough to have pressure cookers can cook them in 30 minutes at 15 pounds pressure after soaking overnight. A pressure saucer cooks them in the same time. The vitamin B-1 that is impaired by the high temperature can be made up by the use of wheat germ, wholegrain cereals and enriched bread. For those persons with delicate digestion, it is sometimes helpful to rub the skins off the boiled or steamed beans.

Canned milk may be substituted for fresh milk in many delicious cream vegetable soups, puddings and ice cream.

Extender

A knowledge of extending or stretching foods that are scarce is also very helpful today. Two pounds of butter may be made from one pound by creaming it in a bowl over warm water and gradually stirring in one pint of fresh milk or one 1 1/2 ounce can of milk. This blend is easy to spread on the many sandwiches for the war industry workers or for school lunches. It does not fit all baking recipes, however. A more stable butter blend is obtained by soaking one tablespoon of plain gelatin in one-fourth cup cold water, dissolving it over hot water and adding it with the milk to the butter.

Whipped cream is really an extender. Commercial 19 per cent coffee cream and even evaporated milk have been successfully whipped after standing two days on the coldest shelf of the refrigerator, as can cream carefully removed by spoon from the top of two-day old refrigerated 4 per cent milk. Viscogen improves the whipping qualities of cream and can be bought under various trade names.

FDR Accused of Going Too Far On Salary Limitation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—The house ways and means committee formally accused President Roosevelt today of going beyond the intent of congress in his executive order limiting salaries to a net of \$25,000 and asked that it be voided.

Thus carrying along what Rep. Disney (D-Okla.) called "a revolt against government by directive," the committee recommended to the house that congress itself set the ceiling on high salaries at their pre-Pearl Harbor levels.

This, the committee said in a report on a bill by Disney setting the pre-Pearl Harbor ceilings, "provides a method of salary limitation by law rather than by directive. It does not admit of confiscation or liquidation of incomes. This provision offers an orderly, legal process."

Americans Have No Cause to Grumble

BALTIMORE, Feb. 25 (AP)—A wave of grumbling surged along a long line of tired ration book registrants at a Baltimore school. It grew stronger, then a teacher stopped work long enough to say: "A few hours' wait shouldn't be considered too great a hardship. I came from a country where I stood in line 14 hours for a loaf of bread—and didn't get it."

The grumbling died instantly.

MARTIN LARSON DIES THURSDAY FROM INJURIES

ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 25 (AP)—Martin H. Larson, 76, a native of Norway, died at the hospital here today from injuries suffered Sunday night when he was struck by an automobile driven, state police report, by Harry Wallace of Roseburg.

Larson suffered a skull fracture when he was knocked down as he crossed the highway to talk to a neighbor in a parked automobile, according to State Police Sergeant Paul Morgan. No charges were filed against the driver.

Larson, a resident of Roseburg since 1919, is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Dora Ritzman, employed in secretarial work in Bremerton navy yards, and two sons, Oliver and Arthur Larson, both residents of Klamath Falls.

New Judge Named To Conduct Trial Of Zuckerman

STOCKTON, Calif., Feb. 25 (AP)—Superior Judge Andrew Schottky of Mariposa county was named to conduct the new trial of Maurice Zuckerman, 60, wealthy produce broker who is charged with killing Otto Dander, 40, in a Stockton bar February 24 a year ago.

The trial has been set for March 5. Zuckerman previously was convicted of manslaughter and served nine months in San Quentin prison before the appellate court ordered a new trial on the grounds there had been "erroneous and highly prejudicial instructions from the trial judge, Judge C. W. Miller, who subsequently disqualified himself from hearing the second trial."
