

GEN. JOHNSON WILL COMMAND 2ND AIR FORCE

FORT GEORGE WRIGHT, Wash., Feb. 25 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Robert Olds will be succeeded as commanding officer of the second air force by Maj. Gen. Davenport Johnson, former director of military requirements, headquarters of the army air force, Washington, D. C., headquarters here announced last night.

Earlier headquarters had announced the temporary retirement because of illness of Gen. Olds, who will go into an army hospital at Miami, Fla. When fully recovered he "will be given a new command commensurate with his outstanding ability," the announcement said. He is suffering from an affliction similar to arthritis.

Before his assignment to Washington General Johnson had headed the Caribbean defense command, assuming that post in August of 1941. Previously he had been assistant to the chief of the army air forces at Washington.

Olds assumed command of the second air force in May, 1942 and under his leadership it has become the training unit for all United States heavy bombardment crews.

17-YEAR-OLDS MAY ENTER AIR RESERVE

Sergeant Frank J. Huhin, commander of the local army recruiting office, announced that young men who have reached their 17th birthday but who have not reached their 18th birthday now have the opportunity to apply for appointment as aviation cadets in the army air corps.

Successful applicants under this plan will not be called for active duty until they have reached their 18th birthday but will be allowed to continue school or will be able to stay at their present place of employment. Candidates who pass the mental and physical examinations will be enlisted in the air corps enlisted reserve immediately after passing the examinations.

When these reservists are called to active duty they will receive 36 weeks of training as a pilot, bombardier or navigator and upon graduation will be commissioned as second lieutenants in the army air forces with base pay of \$245 per month. During the training period, cadets receive \$75 per month, quarters, food, clothing, medical and dental attention and many facilities for recreation are also furnished without cost.

Applicants must be normally healthy and be able to pass the required mental tests prescribed by the service. No formal education is necessary. Full information and application forms may be obtained from the army recruiting office, 219 Post Office building, Klamath Falls.

Rationing Calendar

SHOES
February 9 to June 15 — Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
February 20—Retail sales of canned fruits and vegetables ended at midnight Saturday.

February 22 to 27—Registration for war ration book No. 2 at schools.

March 1—Rationing of canned and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables begins.

SUGAR
March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires.

COFFEE
March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
March 1—All "C" coupon books and most "B" cards must be renewed.
March 21—No. 4 stamps each good for four gallons expire at midnight.

TIRES
February 28—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to this date.
March 31—Cars with A books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle D books.

COMMERCIAL REGISTRATION
March 1 to 10—Restaurants and boarding houses must sign up for point stamps.

All institutional users are requested to phone the ration board for an appointment to register, to save time.

Meat Rationing Problems Giving OPA Gray Hairs; Surgeon's Touch Needed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Wanted: Butchers with a surgeon's touch. . . .

When meat rationing starts, what's to be done if you order a roast and the butcher—as experience indicates will happen—cuts a little over or a bit under the amount you order?

That's just one of the meat problems causing gray hairs around the office of price administration. It's worrying the butchers, too. Those who know say they don't quite see how it'll all work out.

Right now, the OPA has its hands full trying to cope with the black market in meat. That has a direct bearing on the question of what supplies will be available for rationing.

Then there's a question of what to do about shrinkage, spoilage and wastage in computing the amount of meat the butcher is to get.

And what about weighing in the bones? Some of the individuals directly concerned with the problems express private doubts whether a workable basis for meat rationing can be figured out in time to start the system by the end of March, if at all.

Some meat packers and distributors have declared that the best answer would be a broad program to educate the public in conservation—and not ration.

Others have suggested some application of the English plan. In England, meat rationing is based entirely on price. At present, each Britisher gets approximately 22 cents worth a week about one pound, the British information service says.

This system puts a premium on careful cutting. There's no borrowing of next week's values in the English plan, and if the British butcher cuts more than called for, he has to trim or let it go for the same price. However, in this country, price
