If the Indian factions could GET TOGETHER, Britain would probably grant independence to India gladly.

FOR the moment, at least, German resistance in Russia is stiffening, and Russian gains seem to be slowing. Remember that the Russian lines are getting longer and the German lines shorter.

The Russians are closing in today around Novorossisk, apparently preparing to drive the Germans clear out of the Caucasus.

ON the home front, labor troubles in the airplane industry are beginning to look menacing.

The trouble arises out of the fact that shipyard workers have a higher base pay than airplane workers. Oddly enough, the threatened Seattle strike isn't directed at Boeing, which is willing, even anxious, to grant the pay increases demanded.

(In both the shipyards and the airplane factories wages along with other costs are passed on to the taxpayer.)

The issue is up to the war labor board, not the employer, for settlement.

## GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE 2 HOMICIDES

Two homicide cases will be investigated by the Klamath county grand jury when it meets on March 10, in response to an order signed Thursday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The jury will consider the death of Erma Titus, killed by a shotgun blast at Bly. Her husband, Justice of the Peace William Titus of Bly, has been charged with first degree murder in connection with the shooting. He is still in the hospital suffering from wounds which the state alleges he inflicted upon himself in the shooting.

**Wallan Case**  
The county court has appointed James Dixon, long-time farmer of the Bly district, as temporary justice of the peace of Sprague River district.

The jury also will consider the case of Kenneth Wallan, charged with the second degree murder of James Bowman in an alleged Christmas eve fight in the suburbs. District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore said that several other criminal matters are pending for consideration of the jury.

## JUDGE TO RULE ON TRIAL IN TRIANGLE CASE

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Feb. 26 (AP)—Justice of the Peace Paul C. O'Malley will rule next week, whether Walter Duncan, 66, shall stand trial on a charge of slaying Russel (Buck) Cone, 37, alleged lover of Duncan's divorced wife.

At Duncan's preliminary hearing yesterday, a reputed confession, a gun and bullets were offered in evidence by the prosecution, but the defense presented no testimony. Justice O'Malley took the case under advisement.

Duncan has been quoted by Coroner Jack Larry as declaring that he shot Cone after Cone had begun beating him. The coroner reported Duncan said further that Cone fell in love with Mrs. Duncan, 37, after taking a job on Duncan's ranch at Evans creek, 25 miles from Grants Pass, Ore. Cone also was married.

chanics' union in California if the decision is not handed down by Tuesday midnight.

Under Wednesday midnight, after the explanation of the resolution given the meeting by its sponsor, the union's international would be asked to call upon all AFL aircraft unions in the nation to join in a similar protest.

At the same time, the union filed a suit in federal court here demanding that the labor board hand down a decision promptly or withdraw from the case so direct negotiations could be resumed with the Boeing company.
