

# Mrs. Horace Getz Named Club Head

### "Earliest Landscaped Gardens" Topic Discussed By Mrs. Collier at Monday Meeting.

The Klamath Falls Garden club met for the first meeting of the year February the twenty-second in the small library club rooms but only a small crowd attended due to weather and rationing. Election of officers for the new year took place under the direction of Mrs. Frederick Hamilton who presided.

Mrs. H. E. Getz was elected president, Mrs. Will Wood, first vice president, assisted by Mrs. Paul Edwards, Mrs. L. K. Phelps, secretary and treasurer.

It was voted that no flower show will be held this spring, but there will be a non-competitive display on May the tenth along with the library club tea. Funds raised by this affair will be given to the Commandos to aid in carrying on their project here.

Mrs. Getz, program chairman, presented Mrs. Andrew Collier who gave a beautifully worded picture of the "Earliest Landscaped Gardens," beginning with the first recorded garden, "The Garden of Eden." In the early gardens of Egypt, she pointed out, are recognized some of the flowers of today—poppies, lilies, palms and figs. She referred to Syria's beautiful parks and hanging gardens, Solomon's lovely garden, the fact that Abraham bought a garden to be buried in, but that Jerusalem had no gardens as it had no fertilizer.

The early Greek gardens, said Mrs. Collier, were placed around gymnasiums, centers and flat roof gardens. She pictured the Roman Empire villas surrounded by their luxuriant gardens, and stated that many of the Italian gardens have been copied.

Referring to gardens of China and Japan, she said that they created pictures and many have been copied in our parks. For instance, the tea gardens are connected with Japan and also the cherry blossoms.

Enumerating those of other countries, Mrs. Collier pointed out that German's early gardeners were physicians, and that France gardened on a large scale, often with several hundred people working in them. There are no records of early English gardens, except from the monks, who were the first to clip grass for lawns and began using vines to cover houses and buildings.

Mrs. Collier discussed the early gardening ventures of the American colonists, many of whom made gardens in order that they might live. As old world trees and plants were brought to this country, so were many of our native plants returned to Europe where they were cultivated.

City parks, national parks and gardens, California gardens and many other types were discussed by Mrs. Collier.

# Reynolds Discusses Recent Trip East

### Tells Interesting Facts to Soroptimists Concerning War-Time Washington, D. C.

Members of the Soroptimist club heard an interesting talk by Earl C. Reynolds, secretary of the Klamath County chamber of commerce, concerning his recent trip to Washington, D. C., at the Thursday noon luncheon at the Pelican party room. Mr. Reynolds stated that, contrary to all reports, he didn't find travel conditions bad. They were crowded; but he always secured accommodations and never waited over ten minutes to be seated in the diner.

While in Washington, D. C., Mr. Reynolds talked with Mr. Mahoney and with Captain Lawrence Slater. Captain Slater took Mr. Reynolds through the Pentagon building, which was just opened February first for the war department. Mr. Reynolds informed the club that it occupied forty-two acres of land, had four and one-half miles of corridor, and had 40,000 people working in it. The building is large enough to hold three football fields, he estimated. Soroptimists were interested to learn that there are 300,000 people employed in civil service alone in Washington. Most of them are "fighting the Battle of Washington" which is to keep their jobs and keep congress from cutting down the bureau. Mr. Reynolds had interviews with all the Oregon congressmen and his comments on them were enjoyed by the club. He further stated that 222 billion has already been authorized spent for this war and that any senator who tries to apply the brakes on expenditures is called an isolationist.

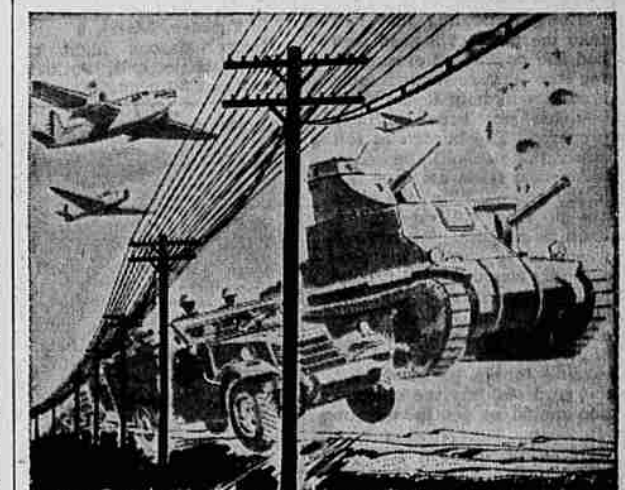
