## Supreme Court Refuses to Review Jehovah Witness Bill

WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—The supreme court today refused to review a decision holding constitutional, as applied to a member of the "Jehovah's Witnesses" organization, a Portland, Ore., ordinance prohibiting parents from permitting their daughters under 18 to "sell, expose, or offer for sale" newspapers, magazines or periodicals on the streets of the city.

Validity of the ordinance was challenged by Mrs. Ada McSparran, who was convicted on a charge of permitting two daughters, nine and 12 years old, to sell "Jehovah's Witnesses" literature. The ordinance also applies to boys under 10. Mrs. McSparran contended that the ordinance violated the right of freedom of the press, freedom of speech, and freedom

to worship God by distributing literature.
