

RUMIL BACKERS TIE ONTO NEW HOLDING TAX

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Congressional "Rumil plan" backers planned today to make a "skip-a-jack-year" provision into legislation imposing a 20 per cent withholding levy against the taxable income of more than 30,000,000 persons earning wages and salaries.

A house ways and means subcommittee approved the withholding levy yesterday, effective July 1, as a means of weekly, semi-monthly or monthly deductions from pay envelopes and checks. The levy would not be an additional tax, but sums collected through it would be applied to actual taxes as they are now computed. The 20 per cent would include the victory tax which already is being withheld.

Good As We Can Do
Under this or any other plan that congress may approve, all taxpayers still must pay at least the first two installments of their 1942 income taxes, due March 15 and June 15.

Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) of the full ways and means committee, returning from a week's rest at naval hospital, said the withholding levy might be "about as good as we can do now," indicating indefinite postponement of final action on the proposal by Bernard Rumil to cancel out one income tax year.

Other Ideas
Rumil plan supporters had other ideas, however, passing word along privately that they would take their fight to the house floor.

The subcommittee by-passed the tax "forgiveness" issue completely for the time being, Chairman Cooper (D-Tenn.) telling newspapermen it was not decided yet whether the withholdings in the last six months of this year would be applied to 1942 or 1943 tax obligations.

Considerable sentiment was evident in the full committee for the imposition of the withholding levy and applying its collections against taxes computed on the basis of income in the previous year, as taxes now are determined, and passing over completely the proposals to cancel out all or part of a tax year. Rumil has proposed that 1943 tax collections be against 1943 income.

SOME CAN APPLY FOR EXTRA SHOES

Under certain circumstances many persons are entitled to and may apply for more than three pairs of shoes a year, said James Mount, OPA rationing official today, in answer to inquiries from workers who need shoes for certain types of work.

Among the "circumstances" that he mentioned were: Growing youngsters whose feet develop quickly and who therefore need more than three pairs a year, plus a youthful tendency to kick tin cans, rocks, footballs or just kick.

Workmen on jobs which cause more wear on shoes than other jobs—those who work in plants in which they spill acid, tar or even molten lead on their shoes—or those who work on rough, abrasive surfaces, or in the lumber woods.

Nurses who need special service footwear.

Those who buy shoes they subsequently cannot wear without injury to their health.

"In all such instances these people with an urgent need for extra shoes have only to go to their rationing boards and prove that need when applying for a certificate that will entitle them to buy an extra pair," said Mount.

Shipyard Workers Get Jail Terms

PORTLAND, March 2 (AP)—Fifteen Vancouver shipyard workers were under jail sentences today after pleading guilty to charges of disorderly conduct.

Presiding District Judge J. R. Meers sentenced each of the men, all of whom had purchased wine in Oregon, to 30 days in the county jail and suspended 30 days.

PRIVATE MUST DIE FOR GIRL SLAYING

KINGSTON, Surrey, England, March 2 (AP)—August Sangret, 29, French-Canadian private in the Canadian army, was convicted today of murdering Joan Wolfe, 19. He was sentenced to death by hanging.

The girl's body was found October 7, 1942, partly buried in a sand mound.

The jury recommended mercy. Asked if he had anything to say before sentence was passed, Sangret replied, "I am innocent, sir. I never killed that girl."

Eric Neve, prosecutor, asserted that Sangret built a wigwam near Hankley Common, Thursley, Surrey, adjoining the military camp where he was stationed, and lived there with the girl. Miss Wolfe, known as the "wigwam girl," was described at the trial as a camp follower who ran away from home.

Point Ration Shopping Hints

Our Government, newspapers, radio stations and your Safeway Store are all doing everything they can to make sure you know how to shop under point rationing... the plan designed to make sure that everybody gets his fair share of the food available. KNOW THAT:

- (1) Point values have nothing to do with dollar-and-cents prices. You have to give the money price and the point stamp price for every purchase in a rationed group.
- (2) You have freedom of choice in using your points to buy any rationed item, provided it is available.
- (3) If you buy foods with a low point value you will be able to buy more of the articles in the same rationed group.
- (4) Point values of all rationed foods are set by the Government and not by the store-keeper or by the manufacturer.
- (5) You are not permitted to buy point rationed items, at any store, without giving point stamps... even on a charge account.
- (6) High point stamps should be used when buying a number of rationed items at one time. Conserve your low point stamps as storekeepers cannot give you ration stamps in change.
- (7) Loose stamps are not valid. Stamps must be torn out of your ration book at the time of purchase and in the presence of your grocer.

Now When You Go Shopping...

- REMEMBER TO:**
 - (1) Allow plenty of time for your shopping under point rationing... it takes longer. Best time to shop is early in the week and early in the day.
 - (2) Be sure and take your War Ration Book No. 2 with you. No stamps... no rationed items.
 - (3) Take your point value chart along with you, too, for convenience. While our store will have price and point values clearly marked on the shelves and on the merchandise, your list will serve as a double check and save lots of extra steps and confusion.
- AND**
