# IMPROPER USE OF TRUCK GAS

Improper use of gasoline rations by truck operators is being investigated, it was announced today by Marshall E. Nauman, district manager of the Office of Defense Transportation.

Nauman said that truck operators are granted certificates of war necessity for specified uses and mileage as indicated by the operator as necessary for the conduct of his business at the time of filling out the application for the certificate. No deviation is permitted and any violation will subject the commercial ve-hicle operator to a loss of his gasoline rations.

Abuses

The following abuses, Nau-man pointed out, are being investigated:

1. Use of a truck for purposes other than stated on the certi-

2. Use of a truck in business operations other than stated on the certificate.

3. Failure to maintain the re-

quired minimum load factor specified on the certificate. Reduced Operations

4. Failure to keep records as required on the certificates and failure to report changes on ad-

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


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
