## DEER HELD DANGER TO STOCK SUPPLY

LAKEVIEW, (Special)—The threat to the livestock industry in Lake county as a result of a deer supply in excess of hunting demands and infiltration of elk, was cited by L. H. Douglas, Portland, assistant supervisor of wildlife and game management, Fremont national forest, in a talk given at the annual meeting of the Fremont Sheepmen's association. While Douglas stated that there were only a few elk known to be in the boundaries of Lake county, he pointed out that the situation prevailing in the Blue mountain region has caused considerable anxiety among sheepmen, who demand that the few elk be eliminated before the situation gets beyond control.

Douglas said: "This community cannot afford to have the valuable resource of browse injured or destroyed for the small difference in numbers of deer between a reasonable number and a destructive number. In the last 20 years cattle have been reduced from about 12,500 to about 8,000 on the Fremont forest and sheep from about 76,000 to about 51,000. Deer have increased from about 1500 to about 25,000."

## Lion's Club to Sponsor Lake Bond Sales for March

LAKEVIEW (Special)—The Lion's club has agreed to sponsor the war bond sales for Lake county this month. Ray Harlan, chairman of the Lake county War Bond Sales committee, was present at the meeting and stated that Lake county had \$9000 yet to go to reach the \$33,000 quota for February, and expressed the need to purchase to the limit of abilities in order that the county does not fall short of its quota.

President Art Iverson appointed a committee composed of Rudy McClane, Euell Elliott and Roehl Watts to take charge of the bond sales during March.

## Rationing Calendar

- RATION BOOK NO 2**  
 March 1-15—Boards will mail books to persons who registered February 25, but did not receive books. New applications accepted March 15.
- March 1**—Rationing of canned, frozen and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables, dried soups, beans, lentils and peas, began.
- RATION BOOK NO 1**  
 March 1-15—Boards will not accept applications for book No. 1 during this period.
- BUGAR**  
 March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires at midnight. Stamp No. 12 good for five pounds, March 16-May 31 inclusive.
- COFFEE**  
 March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.
- GASOLINE**  
 March 21—No. 4 stamps, each good for four gallons, expires at midnight.
- TIRES**  
 March 31—Cars with "A" books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle "D" books.
- SHOES**  
 June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.
- CANNED MEATS, FISH**  
 Retail, wholesale sales suspended until further notice.
- COMMERCIAL REGISTRATION**  
 March 1 to 10—Restaurants and boarding houses must sign up for point stamps.
- All institutional users are requested to phone the ration board for an appointment to register, to save time.
- Institutional users must provide the rationing board with food inventories as of February 28.

## FEED SHORTAGE HITS WALLOWA

ENTERPRISE, March 2 (AP)—Wallowa county stockmen reported an acute feed shortage Saturday.

Hay has been virtually off the market for some time and government feed wheat, on which many livestock raisers have been relying, is exhausted.

Warehouses have practically nothing except government owned wheat or grain against which there are government loans of approximately \$1 a bushel. Stockmen pointed out that if these loans were paid off along with storage charges and interest the sale price would be boosted to around \$1.25 a bushel—prohibitive for feed.

The winter has been unusually severe in this area. Heavy snow has extended to lower levels and livestock were forced off the range for a longer time.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska March 2 (AP)—Three coast guardmen of the quartet who recovered the body of Pilot Harold Gillam have directed that their share of the reward, totaling \$1500, go to the flier's estate for the benefit of his children, the Morrison-Knudsen company has disclosed.

Gillam was one of two victims of the crash January 5 of a Morrison-Knudsen company plane. Four men survived a month of exposure in the Alaskan wilderness following the crash.
