Merch 15-Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires at midnight. Stamp No. 12 good for five pounds, March 16-May 31 inclusive.

March 21-Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of cof-fee, expires at midnight.
