

'OPEN HOUSE' SET FOR NEW BOYS' CLUB

The new quarters of the Klamath Falls Boys' club in the Salvation Army building, Fourth street and Klamath avenue, will be opened for public inspection on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, it was announced Wednesday.

"Open house" will be observed at that time, and Klamath citizens were invited to visit the clubrooms, which are rapidly being completed for the use of the youngsters of the community.

Library Planned
Six patriots were at work Wednesday decorating the basement division of the clubrooms. Shuffleboard, pool, table tennis, punching bags and other sports and game equipment will be installed in the basement.

A branch of the city library is to be established in the building as a part of the reading facilities. Shower baths are already available in a room off the gymnasium, which is at the rear of the building.

Currie of the Salvation Army and the army advisory board are cooperating with the city recreation committee in the establishment and operation of the clubrooms, which will replace the rooms now operating on Klamath avenue near Eighth. The latter rooms have been closed so that equipment may be moved to the other building.

The Junior high boys' glee club, directed by Lillie Darby, will give special musical numbers at the Saturday afternoon event. Andrew Loney will bring the high school girls' glee club to the building for further entertainment.

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Rationing Calendar

RATION BOOK NO 2
March 1-15—Boards will mail books to persons who registered February 25, but did not receive books. New applications accepted March 15.

March 1—Rationing of canned, frozen and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables, dried soups, beans, lentils and peas, began.

RATION BOOK NO 1
March 1-15—Boards will not accept applications for book No. 1 during this period.

SUGAR
March 15—Stamp No. 11, war ration book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires at midnight. Stamp No. 12 good for five pounds, March 16-May 31 inclusive.

COFFEE
March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
March 21—No. 4 stamps, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

TIRES
March 31—Cars with "A" books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle "D" books.

SHOES
June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

CANNED MEATS, FISH
Retail, wholesale sales suspended until further notice.

COMMERCIAL REGISTRATION
March 1 to 10—Restaurants and boarding houses must sign up for point stamps.

All institutional users are requested to phone the ration board for an appointment to register, to save time.

Institutional users must provide the rationing board with food inventories as of February 28.

Idaho Seed Spuds Contracted for, Deliveries Made

BOISE, Idaho, March 3 (AP)—Idaho certified seed potatoes have practically all been contracted for and a few deliveries have been made, the state extension service reported Tuesday.

Interest in seed potatoes from outside the state has been greater than usual, with inquiries especially heavy from California and Washington.

The report suggested that the recent action of the food distribution administration in reserving No. 1 potatoes in Idaho for military use may take most of the available remaining supplies.

FBI Seeks Source of Phony Clothes Rationing Rumor

WASHINGTON, March 3—Some time ago, before OPA even had a dummy or ration book No. 3, up popped a story that a clothes ration book was ready for distribution. The usual version said that a woman lost her sugar ration book and wrote to OPA in Washington for a new one. By return mail she received a ration book entitling her to \$80 worth of clothes a year.

Whereupon—the phony tale goes—the OPA realizing its mistake, begged her to return the book and never, never mention the fact that she had seen it. The FBI is now working on this story because it follows very closely German propaganda broadcasts over short-wave to America. The Nazis would like American housewives to hoard everything, because they know that the more hoarding, the sooner we'll have had inflation.

FIR, PLYWOOD WAGE BOOST IS EXTENDED

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3 (AP)—Fir and plywood plants of the Pacific northwest were under orders today to give retroactive pay increases to employees who did not get them December 17.

On that date the west coast lumber commission ordered a 90-cent wage minimum, retroactive to May 1 in some cases. This resulted generally in a 74-cent hourly increase and the commission ordered it extended to the higher wage brackets.

Some employers protested they already had given increases in some of the higher brackets and the additional raises would throw wage scales out of line.

Pine Adjustment
The commission rejected this protest yesterday on the grounds there was no established pay standard in the upper brackets.

Chairman Ben H. Kizer said, however, research is continuing with the hope of setting industry-wide standards in the future.

In another decision, applying to both pine and fir regions, the commission authorized temporary piece rate increases whenever snow conditions cut fallers' and buckers' earnings below normal. Such temporary adjustments need no longer be reported to the commission, Kizer said, although fallers and buckers must agree to the pay changes.

GOVERNMENT WHEAT SALE REQUESTED

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Representatives of the nation's poultrymen, dairymen and livestock feeders urged before the house agriculture committee Tuesday enactment of legislation to sell an additional 100,000,000 bushels of government owned wheat for stock feed.

Describing corn and protein feeds except wheat as "alarmingly scarce," one witness said that unless action "at the earliest possible hour" is taken to relieve the shortage, liquidation of the poultry and dairy industries threatens.

Edwin T. Benson, executive secretary of the national council of farm cooperatives, asserted "the feed situation is becoming increasingly serious. We hope the committee will take favorable action at the earliest possible hour."

TRUCK MILEAGE MUST BE SLASHED

Pacific coast motor carriers were told today by the Office of Defense Transportation that in order to get government help in obtaining spare parts they must immediately take definite steps to restrict mileage operations to the minimum.

Marshall E. Nauman, district manager of ODT's Division of Motor Transportation said that over-the-road contract and common carriers must eliminate competition through action agreements resulting in joint use of equipment and facilities by March 31.

To aid carriers in developing such plans, Nauman said that ODT advisory committees, including representatives of the carriers and ODT, are being set up in all principal Pacific coast points served by more than one carrier.
