

# CEILING PRICE ON BEEF, PORK TO BE SET UP

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown announced today uniform, community-wide dollar and cents ceiling prices on pork and beef will be established shortly in an effort to break up black markets in meat.

Brown's disclosure was made to a senate agriculture subcommittee which has heard packers complain that many independents are being forced out of business by a squeeze between ceiling prices on meat and rising, uncontrolled prices of live hogs and cattle.

**Matter of Days**

Black markets have been operating, Brown said, because under present ceilings, meat retailers are permitted to charge the highest prices they received for various meats last March, thus varying the ceiling price from store to store and making it possible for those charging higher prices to pay a premium for black market pork and beef.

"The new ceiling prices on pork should be out in a matter of days," Brown testified, "with those on beef to follow shortly."

The new ceilings, fixed for each community, will be accompanied by an acceleration of a drive to convince the public that purchase of "uninspected black market meat is dangerous," Brown said.

## 4TH TERM TALK GETS UNDERWAY

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Members of the higher councils of the democratic national committee recommended to President Roosevelt today that he should be the party's candidate for reelection in 1944 if the war still is on, but National Democratic Chairman Frank C. Walker said they "got no response" from the chief executive.

A committee consisting of officials and members of the national committee called on the president, and Walker said "two or three" of them spoke of a fourth term.

Walker said he did not know whether the president had heard the remarks about another term, and if he did, had smiled them off. Walker said it was not a serious presentation of the issue.

## KNOX WARNS OF HIGH CASUALTY RATE IN NAVY

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—A grim warning to expect a 10 per cent casualty rate in navy personnel was laid before congress and the nation today as Secretary of the Navy Knox disclosed an operating force plan calling for a navy "big enough to dominate all seas over the world."

The solemn navy estimate that it would lose, and have to replace, one man out of each ten—killed or wounded—came to Knox and ranking naval officials unfolded their program for building up personnel strength to 2,250,000 by July, 1944.

**Reduction Made**

Knox's outline of the navy's "operating force" plan and his figures on potential costs of the sea warfare were made public by the house subcommittee on naval appropriations as it completed work on a new \$4,000,000,000 supplemental naval spending bill.

As it emerged from the subcommittee the measure carried \$3,818,206,583 in direct appropriations—a reduction of \$187,793,417 from the budget estimates—and contract authorizations, amounting to \$239,740,400.

**Study Advised**

The subcommittee pared the navy's estimate of \$147,240,000 for clothing and estimated personnel strength of 2,250,000 down to an even \$100,000,000, advising congress that:

"While no ceiling has been imposed by law upon naval enlisted strength built up through the reserve, an expansion of such magnitude should be the subject of careful scrutiny and recommendations to the house by the naval-affairs committee."

**RESERVE FUNDS**

## Sixteen Awarded Medals for Courage Under Enemy Fire

WITH U. S. FORCES ON THE TUNISIAN FRONT, March 1 (Delayed) (AP)—Sixteen officers and men were awarded Silver Stars and 29 others were cited by their commanding general today for outstanding courage under fire in recent fighting in Tunisia, as well as heroism during the American landing at Oran last November 8.

A medium tank crew was cited for destroying a German plane, a wheeled vehicle, six anti-tank guns and a pill box, killing or wounding all enemy personnel in them during a single engagement. Among those was Corp. Otto Nooy, Pendleton, Ore.

## Oregon's Tin Can Shipments Bring Tangible Results

PORTLAND, March 3 (AP)—Oregon's tin can shipments so far this year, 670,527 pounds, produced 670 pounds of pure tin—enough for the manufacture of 95 long-range heavy bombers, 25 light army tanks and 12 short range heavy bombers.

So said Claude I. Sersanous, state chairman of the general salvage committee, today. He disclosed, too, that by a new process Oregon's cans aided in producing 280 tons of copper after giving off their tin.

## COAL IN PERU

Peru is estimated to contain 6,250,000,000 tons of coal, of which 73 per cent is lignite, 20 per cent anthracite, and 7 per cent various kinds of bituminous.

## SOLONS PONDER CANADIAN TAX PLAN FOR U.S.

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—The Canadian plan to forego 50 per cent of 1942 taxes on earned personal income was viewed as a possible pay-as-you-go compromise for the United States today by some leading opponents of the Ruml plan to abate all of one year's taxes.

The joint congressional tax staff requested Ottawa to furnish Washington with more details on its plan immediately.

**Deadlock Persists**

Chairman Doughton (D-N. C.) of the tax-framing house ways and means committee pointed out that Canada's action was similar to a suggestion he already has made to break the deadlock on the question of how much taxes should be abated to ease the transition to pay-as-you-go.

However, Rep. Carlson (R-Kas.), author of legislation embracing the proposal by Beardsley Rummy, New York banker, to by-pass a full tax year, said he could accept no plan that re-

quired the collection of more than one year's taxes within one year, in the swap-over to a current collection system.
