

Coast Cities Must Be Prepared, Says Gen. Grant

SEATTLE, March 4 (AP)—Pacific coast cities must be prepared for anything in the present war, Maj. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant, grandson of the civil war leader, said here last night.

"Countries which have prepared only for what they thought most likely to happen have been destroyed," he said. "I don't mean to say that I consider air raids on west coast cities actually imminent. But they are possible—because it's good military strategy to do what's least expected."

DAMAGES AWARDED IN ACCIDENT CASE

A circuit court jury in Multnomah county this week awarded \$25,000 damages to Mildred Ross, Junction City, as a result of an automobile accident near Algoma, Klamath county, on December 27, 1940.

Defendants in the action were Frank Hayes, Consolidated Freightways, Inc., and Albert E. Ault.

Miss Ross was riding in a car driven by Hayes which met a Consolidated Freightways truck driven by Ault. The truck was loaded with a sedan automobile. The truck and Hayes car collided, and sedan came to rest partially on the Hayes automobile.

Miss Ross subsequently sued Hayes, the truck company, and Ault, for \$45,593 damages, claiming she was permanently injured. The jury awarded her \$25,000. The suit was tried in Multnomah county.
