

TWO ESTATES OVER \$10,000 PROBATED HERE

Probate procedure was started here this week in connection with two estates valued in excess of \$10,000.

First National bank of Portland is named executor in the will of the late James M. Baker, well known business man, and the "probable value" of the estate is given as in excess of \$10,000. In addition to the will of Mr. Baker, a codicil has been filed leaving immediate cash legacies to his widow, Ida Jean Baker, and to two sons by a former marriage, James Baker, Jr., and Wilmer Dare Baker.

The bulk of the estate was left in a trust with the First National bank of Portland, with the widow and the two sons of Mr. Baker as beneficiaries.

Wilson S. Wiley and John B. Ebinger are attorneys for petitioners.

Stebbins Will Filed

The will of the late Caroline M. Stebbins, prominent local woman and widow of the late G. I. Stebbins, contractor, was also filed for probate, and instruments show that it is valued at approximately \$12,000. Mrs. Stebbins left jewelry, car, and other personal affects to her nephew, Lawrence Raymond Gallagher, Klamath Falls and the residue of her estate to her brother, Charles Gallagher, Centralia, Wash., and his daughter, Elizabeth Jean.

Arthur Schaupp is executor of this estate.

This year for the first time, in order to avoid tapping vital defense material, contributors to the Red Cross war fund will receive a paper lapel tag bearing the Red Cross insignia.

STAGGERED WORK HOURS REQUESTED

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—Joseph B. Eastman, defense transportation director, today asked all cities of 10,000 or more population to develop programs for staggering work hours to increase service of existing transit vehicles.

Eastman wrote 1000 war transportation administrators urging them to work with regional offices of ODT's division of local transport to work out adequate programs. These administrators have been appointed by mayors to cooperate with ODT.

The ODT director reported the war department planned to require its contractors to study working hours with a view to adjustments in order to obtain greater utilization of mass transportation facilities.

OVERLAP PERIOD PROVIDED FOR RATION STAMPS

To aid consumers who may run out of ration stamps for processed foods before the first ration period expires, the Office of Price Administration has provided a 7-day overlap period—the last week of March—during which time consumers may spend both their first period and their second period stamps.

Stamps A, B and C are valid for the first period and may be used from March 1 through March 31. Stamps for the second period may be used from March 25 through April 30. During the overlapping period of March 25 through March 31 stamps for both March and April may be used. After March 31, however, Stamps A, B and C will not be valid.

period, OPA pointed out that it will help consumers who have a few low value stamps left at the end of the ration period. These stamps, which might not be sufficient to buy any desired items, can be used with stamps of the second period for the purchase of any of the rationed foods.

Consumers are reminded that since storekeepers cannot give them change in points, they should, whenever possible, use high value stamps first rather than those of low value. For example, in buying a can of peas worth 10 points, they should use two 8-point stamps, rather than an 8, a 5, 2 and 1-point stamps.
