Gen. George C. Kenney busy the past few days awarding Distinguished Flying Crosses. He is commander of the allied air forces in the southwest Pacific.

Among the awards presented were:
Air Medal to Sgt. Ray D. Holcomb, Eugene, Ore., who participated in more than 100 hours of operational flight missions; Distinguished Flying Cross to Master Sgt. Carl W. Thrasher, Philomath, Ore.; and Corp. William H. Parker, Ralston, Wash., who took part in more than 200 hours of operational flight missions.

Aussie House Has Confidence in Allied Victory

CANBERRA, Australia, March 4 (AP)—The Australian house of representatives broke into prolonged cheering today when Prime Minister John Curtin read General MacArthur's communique announcing the rout of a 22-ship Japanese convoy en route to New Guinea.

On behalf of the commonwealth Curtin expressed pride in the achievement of MacArthur's airmen and declared the war would not be lost because of any deficiencies in the allied fighting forces or lack of skill on the part of their leaders.
