COKE BOTTLE BLOW BRINGS KLAMATH SUIT

A head blow from a coke bottle in a theatre is the basis of a \$10,000 damage suit filed in circuit court Friday by Helen Applegate Turvey, Klamath Theatre, Inc., is named defendant in the suit.

Mrs. Turvey complains that while in the Pine Tree theatre on June 23, 1942, she was struck a severe blow with a heavy missile—a coke bottle—with the result that she suffered pains in her head, dizziness, impairment of eyesight and impairment of the functions of her left knee.

Alleging that the theatre operators should have protected her from this alleged injury, she asks \$10,000 in general damages and \$70 in special damages. U. S. Balentine is her attorney.

Wheat closed 1-1/8c lower, May \$1.47 1/2, July \$1.48-1.48 1/2, corn was unchanged at ceilings, May \$1.00, oats finished unchanged to 1c lower after hitting new seasonal highs and rye lost 1-1/2c.

Additional contracting of 40,000 fleeces in Wyoming was reported at a grease price range of 38 1/2 to 40 cents with most purchases at the higher figure. Business in Boston was very quiet.
