### Ban On Silver Purchase Struck From Treasury Bill

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP) Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) said Thursday an appropriation sub-committee voted unanimously to strike from the \$1,200,000,000 treasury-postoffice bill a houseapproved amendment which would withhold funds from the treasury for the future purchase and transportation of silver un-der the 1934 purchase act.

McCarran said that all mem-bers of the subcommittee who were present joined in the action to eliminate the amendment, which was adopted February 8 by a 204 to 104 vote in the house.

He predicted full committee approval of the action, adding that he was "certain" the senate also would vote to kill the house
